#### 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Use etching and intaglio techniques in production of art work.
- 2. Demonstrate advanced skills in silkscreen printing and computer based imagery.
- 3. Apply the process of independent research in art.
- 4. Use the critique process to identify and define the elements of printmaking.

### 4. Course Content and Schedule

This course contains several detailed demonstrations, discussions and projects – your attendance and participation is required and appreciated in order to understand the course content and techniques.

# Jan 5-Feb 9 Photo emulsion Screen Print project Assignment: Deconstructed Object

"Objects embody mass of moments in time. Their forms are various, and consequently their depictions are various" –Kasimir Malevich

-take apart or break an object, the pieces are your image/subject, arrange or reassemble then photograph or draw

Required: Object to be deconstructed - break, disassemble, cut, flatten etc.; your deconstructed object, to photograph, scan or draw; Photoshop and/or Illustrator for further object deconstruction; print as clear film positive for exposure on screen (please note max 3 clear film postives)

May be a single image, a diptych or tryptic

Materials: Camera or scanner or photocopy, or drawing materials; photo emulsion and remover, water based screen printing ink, paste, "orange cleaner", packing tape, magic tape, printing papers

Tools: screens, scoop coater, exposure unit, easels, tape guns, packing tape, squeegees, power washer

### Woodblock – Mokuhanga, traditional Japanese woodblock method Independent Project, based on your sketchbook studies and sensibilities Pre-ceded by a mini project

Materials: Shina woodblocks, knifes, paper, nori glue, watercolors, brushes, printing papers

Tools: carving tools, barens

## March 9-April 10 Etching – hardground on copper Bring drawing into print Independent Project, based on your sketchbook studies and sensibilities

Materials: copper, ferric chloride acid, rollers, printmaking inks, Tarleton, hardground, printing papers, chine colle Tools: etching tools, palette knives, both presses and blankets
