#### 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students will demonstrate a basic competency in the Spanish language and general knowledge of Spanish culture by:

- 1. Understanding, writing, and speaking Spanish, using limited grammatical structures.

- 3. Using and acquiring sufficient vocabulary and knowledge of grammar to be able to write, read and comprehend written and spoken Spanish at a basic level.

Strong study habits such as reading ahead for the next class, coming to class prepared, learning information fully before moving on, discussing and asking questions, utilizing office hours for questions and review, and working with classmates will help you tremendously to succeed in this course and to learn Spanish. Though you will not be graded on assignments from the textbook website (Supersite), the language audio files found there will provide additional opportunities outside of class to develop your listening skills. Remember, listening is a skill that improves with practice. Practicing your listening skills will improve your speaking, reading and writing as well.

All that said, we are here to have fun and learn as much as we can about a fascinating and broad subject!

# 5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Your work will be evaluated in terms of the following grading breakdown:

## Pop quizzes – 2% each (10% of final grade)

Five short surprise quizzes will be given periodically throughout the semester. If a student is absent the day a quiz is given, s/he will forfeit the marks for that quiz.

### Written assignments - (25% of final grade)

Two formal compositions will be submitted, both consisting of two drafts: *borrador* (draft), worth 60% and *versión final*, worth 40%.

The borrador will be written in class. You may ask questions as well as use your textbook and notes to complete it. Your instructor will grade this version and include comments on how you might improve it.

You will then incorporate these suggestions into the *versión final* to be re-submitted. This final version should be 300 words, typed and double-spaced, using Times New Roman font and correct written accent marks.

Note: The writing is expected to be ORIGINAL and completed without online translators or proofreading by anyone else. Work that suggests the use of external help will not be accepted.

# Two in-class exams – (25% of final grade)

Students will complete two exams (one hour each), both of which will include a listening comprehension component.

Participation (including oral proficiency) – (20% of final grade)

Participation marks will be based on two criteria: homework completed in full and on time, and active participation in class.

- Homework (10%): All chapter assignments from the text are to be <u>prepared in advance and written out</u>. Daily homework will be assigned in class and may consist of grammar/vocabulary exercises (either from the book or handouts), reading assignments and comprehension questions. Students will sometimes be asked to use portions of their completed homework during in-class activities; therefore, all homework should be done before class. If a student is absent, s/he will forfeit the marks for homework due that day.
- Attendance and Participation (10%): Regular class attendance and work is crucial while learning a foreign language. Attendance at every class is mandatory and will be monitored. Oral expression is essential while learning a foreign language. Students are expected to participate actively in all class and group activities and will be graded on oral proficiency demonstrated in class. Active participation means asking questions, answering thoroughly, listening to others and speaking Spanish with classmates. Taking risks with the language is essential to making progress in learning a language and is therefore required.

## Final exam – (20% of final grade)

The final exam will fall during the final exam period and includes a listening comprehension component. Missing a class means forfeiting your daily mark for attendance, participation and homework and may mean missing a pop-quiz. Homework will not be accepted outside of class. In this class, there is a **NO MAKE-UP policy**. This means if you miss an activity or exam, you cannot make it up.

Illness, accident and family affliction are the only legitimate reasons to miss graded work. The instructor reserves the right to require a doctor's note if a student is absent due to illness. Students who are absent the day a test is given, or an assignment is due, will receive a zero, unless **prior** arrangements have been made with the instructor.

Remember: It is your responsibility to find out from colleagues what class work, announcements or assignments you have missed while absent, as well as to check the D2L site for this course periodically.
