Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate the use of traditional and non-traditional processes integral with creative exploration and aesthetic development.
2. Describe the creative process in the planning and creation of 3D artwork using drawings and blueprints.
3. With clay as the primary medium, combine other media, mechanics and innovative processes to interpret and develop ceramic imagery.

Temporary Grade	Description

IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
