Prerequisites:

Math 10 or assessment. and PSYC 110 and one of either PSYC 120, 130, 150 or 164.

Course Description

Lectures: One 2 hour lecture per week designed to provide information on the science of psychology. Topics include; science, formulating research designs and questions, measurement of variables, research methods. data analysis, drawing valid conclusions, and writing research reports.. Labs: One 1.5 hour lab per week designed to provide students with knowledge of and experience with various research methods, skills and statistics. (Your class schedule indicates your assigned lab section)

Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Lab Assignments 25% Course projects 15% In class activities 7.5% Tests (3) 17.5% each

Lab Assignments

These are activities that illustrate important course concepts and develop your research and writing skills. They may be completed individually or in pairs. You must be in attendance to participate in the lab. There is a written assignment for each lab which is either handed in during the lab or at the beginning of the following week's lab. Familiarity with D2L is necessary.

Course projects

You will complete 2 projects for this course.

Lit review/introduction. Oct 14th

You will select a research topic of interest, complete a literature review of that area, and write an introduction section to a research paper. You will hand in a title page, the introduction section and a references section.

Research report. Nov 18th

You will be assigned a research project. You will design the research and collect data.. You will analyze the data and write up a report. The report will include a methods section, results section, a discussion section, appendices (informed consent form, etc.), and a references section.

Tests

Tests will be comprised of multiple choice, matching and written response questions. Tests only cover material since the previous test.

In class activities

During the lectures you will complete various tasks, games, assignments and activities related to the content of the course.

Make-up tests for missed tests will only be allowed with proper documentation. You must contact the instructor <u>the day</u> of the test, and provide documentation, within 7 days of the missed test date to be eligible for the make-up test.
