COURSE OUTLINE

In this course we will be looking at the cultural construction of gender through an examination of the lives of women cross-culturally. We will be studying topics such as childbirth, female genital cutting, veiling, marriage, work, surrogacy, gender violence, and globalization. The sites of our attention include Canada, United States, Niger, India, China and more. In addition to learning some of the key concepts and research methods in anthropology, you will be introduced to the gendered experiences of men and women from around the world.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Outline the main tenets of the feminist perspective in anthropology.
- 2. Explain the biosocial nature of pregnancy and childbirth.

3. Outline the cross-cultural patterns of marriage, gender division of labour, and activities originating in the domestic sphere.

4. Describe the impact of international development on women.

5. Critically evaluate relevant topics such as veiling, seclusion, and female genital modification using cultural relativism.

6. Apply the feminist anthropology perspective to issues pertaining to women's lives in Canada and around the world.

7. Apply the anthropological perspective in writing an anthropological paper.

4. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(A) Assignments (45%)

1. Birth Stories (20%)

Due: February 10th

The purpose of this assignment is to allow students to apply what they are learning in class to their own lives. In this class we will be talking about anthropological research methods including semistructured interviews and life narratives, both of which require interviewing skills. For this assignment students will be conduct an interview with their birth mothers (if possible) about their birth experience(s). If you do not have contact with your birth mother, you may interview another woman who is a family member or a female friend who is a mother. A short writing assignment will follow the interview and transcription work.

2. FGC Presentations & Paper (20%)

Due: March 16th

Female genital cutting is a difficult topic to talk about. This assignment will require students to practice cultural relativism while engaging with a challenging topic. This assignment includes group work, a short in-class presentation, and an individual paper.

3. Surrogacy Brief (5%)

Due: April 4th

Students write a short brief about the commercial surrogacy industry in India, and participate in an inclass discussion on this topic.

(B) Exams (55%)

Midterm Exam (25%)

Date: February 24th

The exams consist of multiple choice, definitions, and short/long answer questions. Exams must be written during the scheduled times, unless a physician's medical certificate is presented to the instructor.

Final Exam (30%)

Date: Scheduled during the final exam period

The exams consist of multiple choice, definitions, and short/long answer questions. Exams must be written during the scheduled times, unless a physician's medical certificate is presented to the instructor. The final exam will be written during the scheduled exam period after the last week of classes. Do not make travel plans until the exam timetable is posted!
