2. Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe major contemporary issues in psychology and explain their historical antecedents.
- Apply psychological theories and understanding of current psychological issues to personal experience.
- 3. Conduct impartial studies of psychological topics and arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Classes will be comprised of lectures and seminar work. Material from the text and selected readings related to current psychological issues and treatments will be examined. Seminar work includes discussions, activities, assignments, and student presentations. Seminar attendance will be taken and seminar participation is very important for student learning. **DOING THE**

ASSIGNED READING BEFORE CLASS WILL HELP IN THE UNDERSTANDING OF LECTURES AND DISCUSSIONS. ASSIGNED READING IS PERTINENT TO DOING WELL ON

Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

*Three exams will comprise multiple choices, true and false, short answer and essay.

Exams require you to apply the terms and concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions. The scores on all three quizzes will comprise 54% of course grade. Each exam is worth 18%. EXAMS ARE NOT ACCUMULATIVE. Please refer to handout distributed in class for details. There will be no make-up opportunities for an exam missed without a medical note.

<u>Three Chapter Reviews:</u> will comprise multiple choice and true and false questions on material covered in class and chapter readings. The purpose is to ensure the student remains current with the notes and text readings. Each review corresponds to the same material as each of the exams and administered as a review to the exam.

Each of the three reviews is worth 5%.

Thirty minute Seminar Presentation-Social Issue: in teams of three or four students will work on a presentation of a social issue of interest. Further details will be discussed in seminar and guidelines will be provided. Seminar teams will be formed during the second week of classes. This assignment is worth 20% including both oral for 40 points and written for 10 points. A written outline of your responsibilities is due February 25 Lecture, (one per group). Two mark penalty is applied to a late or no submission.

EACH STUDENT IS REQUIRED TO COMPLETE: written presentation report requiring: a short title paginated title page including: running head-long title of topic, course name and section, instructor's name, student's name, and date, a referenced ten fact sheet with each fact referenced, a copy of the first page of a research article, and a reference page including a minimum of three references per group member. All references are to follow APA 6th edition guidelines. Please refer to APA sample provided in class and a two page self-evaluation. EACH PERSON IS RESPONSBILE FOR HIS/HER WRITTEN REPORT.

Lecture attendance and seminar activities are part of your participation grade. Seminars will be used for working in dyads and teams. If you miss a seminar, it is your responsibility to contact other students in order to catch up on any missed material. You must be in attendance to participate in any seminar activities. Temporary Description

STUDENT STUDY TECNIQUES: There are 6 phases for effective studying (PQ4R)

- 1. Preview: Scan chapter titles, subtitles, and chapter summary before reading the chapter
- 2. **Question**: formulate questions from the textbook, lecture notes using headings and subheadings. Use on line glossary and flash cards to define terminology and concepts
- 3. Read: be sure to read theories and concepts to compare and contrast similarities and differences between the bio-psychosocial perspectives. For example how does psychoanalytic theory compare to the cognitive social learning theory? Keep your questions in mind and do not skip graphs, boxes, tables etc.
- **4. Retrieve:** prepare to come to lecture asking questions after you test yourself multiple times. If uncomfortable asking questions in class than email questions or book a time to see instructor. Also self-testing is available on the free book companion website (www.worthpublishers.com/myers).
- 5. **Review:** Create a summary covering all your questions and answers. Complete chapter reviews and list all the key terms and operationally define.
- 6. **Read:** read the chapter a second time, following class/seminar. Reading the chapter for any missed detail in order to apply your conceptual understanding using examples.
