This course examines the Canadian criminal justice system, its components, process, objectives, and functionaries. It includes an analysis of discretion, diversion, decision-making processes and the operational practices of the system.

- Identify and critically discuss contemporary issues affecting the structure and operations
 of the criminal justice system (e.g. youth justice, female offenders and Aboriginal
 justice).

• Court Report – 15% Due November 7

You are required to attend and observe a criminal case in Provincial or Supreme Court at the Victoria or Western Communities Courts. Your written or oral report will summarize the proceedings observed.

• Criminal Justice Process Report – 20% Due December 5

Working in pairs, you are required to apply the knowledge gained in this course by guiding a criminally accused person through the criminal justice process from the point of arrest to release from the correctional system.

• Current Event Discussions – 15% Random Dates

During randomly selected classes current criminal justice events will be discussed. Attendance and participation is required to attain the marks for these discussions.

Temporary Grades:

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

Instructional Policies:

Late Penalty
