# CALENDAR DESCRIPTION:

This course provides an examination of the Canadian criminal justice system, its components, processes, objectives, and functionaries. This includes an analysis of discretion, diversion, decision making processes, and the operational practices of the system.

- 1. Communicate an understanding of the legislative basis, structure, and functions of the various components making up the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 2. Identify and critically discuss contemporary issues facing our criminal Justice system
- 3. Track the progress of an accused person through the justice process and identify the various options the system has for holding offenders accountable for their crime.

# **Exams (Quizzes and Final Exam)**

#### **Court Report**

You are required to attend and observe a criminal case in Provincial or Supreme Court at 850 Burdett Ave., in Victoria (Youth court is not an option). Your written report will summarize the proceedings observed. More information will be provided

#### **Criminal Justice Process Synthesis**

Working in pairs, you are required to apply the knowledge gained in the course by guiding a criminally accused person through the criminal justice process from the point of arrest to release from the correctional system and reintegration back into society.

# Thought Paper 1 -Assignment 10% of final grade Due October 12<sup>th</sup>, 2016

Your thought paper should be a short (1 page minimum, 4 pages maximum) independently written paper where you explain your opinion towards the assigned question. For this short paper you can write using the materials from the lectures and assigned textbook for this class. No additional research or references is required but is accepted. In the thought papers, I am looking for evidence of critical thinking. While I will assign some points for grammar, writing style, and organization, the main focus of my feedback will be the degree to

which you demonstrate comprehension of the important concepts discussed in this course and discuss them adequately and concisely in the allotted page range. There are many interesting topics and issues that arise when examining the criminal justice system in Canada. You will be required to write your first Thought Paper on one of the following questions:

1. Why is the Charter of Rights and Freedoms important in our justice system?

2. Discuss the role of discretion in the criminal justice system. Would our criminal justice system be better with MORE or LESS discretion?

3.In considering police powers in Canada, do you feel that the police have too much power or not enough power to carry out their role? Why?

4. From your perspective, what do you feel are the biggest challenges for police officers today and why? What could be done?

# Thought Paper 2 – Due November 16<sup>th</sup> 2016 - Assignment 10% of your final grade

Your thought paper2should be a short (1-page minimum, 4 pages maximum) independently written paper where you explain your opinion towards the question. For this short paper you can write using the materials learned from the lectures and assigned textbook for this class. No additional research or references is required but is accepted. In the thought papers, I am looking for evidence of critical thinking regarding an important course concept. While I will assign some points for grammar, writing style, and organization, the main focus of my feedback will be the degree to which you demonstrate comprehension of the important concepts discussed in this course and discuss them adequately and concisely in the allotted page range. Answer one of the following questions:

1.Discuss the pros and cons of an adversarial system of justice. How does this affect the ability to examine the "true story" around any particular crime?

2.What is your opinion about the current role of victims in our justice system? Should they be more or less involved? What are the challenges or opportunities?

3. Surveys tell us there is huge public dissatisfaction with sentences imposed by the courts. How could this be changed? In particular, do you think the sentences needs to be changed, or the way they are communicated or explained?

4. What challenges do judges face today in sentencing? What can be done?

All work must be properly referenced using the APA format. All written assignments for this course must be type written, double spaced, on one side of 8.5"x 11" white paper. All assignments must only be stapled in the upper left corner (one staple only) and without any plastic or duo tang type covers. Assignments submitted contrary to these directions will not be graded.

All assignments submitted for evaluation must be the original work of the student (s) and produced for this course only. The submission of assignments completed for other courses may be considered as academic dishonesty.

# f. Course Completion Requirements

Students must complete all evaluative requirements to receive a passing grade for this course. Students failing to complete all the requirements will receive an F grade.

# g. Plagiarism
