### 2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

1. Notate from dictation, sight-sing, and improvise a melody which forms a part of a brief excerpt of species counterpoint, a tonal melody, or a line of simple diatonic harmonizations.
2. Recognize by ear, reproduce with the voice, notate from dictation, and sight-sing from written notation the discrete pitches of scales, triads, and seventh chords in a diatonic key.
3. Recognize by ear modulation to the dominant key using secondary dominants and diminished chords in a harmonized musical fragment.
4. Vocalize the pitches indicated above a bass note by simple figured bass and root-quality chord notation.
5. Identify by ear the beginning and ending points of major sections within a work in simple binary and ternary form.

### 3. Required Materials

- (a) **Textbook:** *Music for Sight Singing*, Ninth Edition, by Rogers and Ottman. Available at the Camosun College bookstore. Textbook will be used during EVERY class.
- (b) **Supplies:** To EVERY class, bring staff paper, loose-leaf paper, sharp pencil, and eraser.
- (c) **Other:** Computer access to the course website on D2L. Weekly homework will be posted. See Section 7, Recommended Materials, below for supplementary course resources.

### 4. Course Content and Schedule

**Dates:** 14 Weeks, September 6 - December 10. Plus, December 12-20 for final exams.

**Class Location:** Victoria Conservatory of Music, Room 203.

**Class Meeting Times:** Section X01: Wednesdays and Fridays, 11:30 AM - 12:20 PM.  
Section X02: Wednesdays and Fridays, 12:30-1:20 PM.

**Holidays:** Week 10, Friday, November 11: Remembrance Day - No Class.

- (a) Classroom time, 2 hours per week; Estimated out-of-class time, 2 hours per week provided student attends all classes. The amount of time spent practicing for this course will vary widely from student to student.
- (b) The weekly schedule is outlined below on Page 6. For each week of the term, class topics, textbook chapters, and assessment due dates are provided. Starting in Week 2, **weekly homework** assignments will be due at the beginning of class on Wednesdays. These assignments will usually involve accessing the course website on D2L.
- (c) In general, Wednesdays will focus on sight singing/reading skills and Fridays will focus on dictation/writing skills (some cross-over is likely). Class time will be spent practicing skills together and individually, and will include periodic **pop quizzes** (unannounced) at the beginning of class (don't be late!). Attendance and participation is mandatory, as this is a course that depends on in-class practice.
- (d) There will be a two-part comprehensive **final exam** at the end of the term. The two parts of the final exam may occur any time within the final exam period (December 12-20), and all students must be present for both parts. DO NOT make travel plans that overlap with any part of the exam period. Examination schedules are posted on the post-secondary bulletin board at the VCM by late October.

#### 4. Course Content and Schedule (Continued)

- (e) Late homework will be accepted with a penalty of 20% of the points. There are no make-ups for missed quizzes or exams unless your absence is excused AND notice was given PRIOR to class. Absences may be excused for illness or emergency when appropriate documentation is promptly forwarded to the instructor. In the case of illness, documentation is required from a doctor (or certified healthcare professional) that includes a clear statement of WHAT you could not do and WHEN you could not do it (e.g., "Student was bedridden from October 5-7," or "Student will not be able to use right hand for two weeks, October 1-15"). It is not necessary to disclose the reason for your illness. Upon approval of your doctor's note, accommodations within reason will be made to reschedule missed assessments.
- (f) Do not bring noise-making electronics to class. If you must, do not leave them in silent mode, turn them OFF. A zero-tolerance policy for beeps, rings, and buzzes will be observed during class time. Noisy food is also prohibited in the classroom.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 <sup>rd</sup> course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

- (c) MacGAMUT software for ear-training drills and practice. <https://www.macgamut.com/> An optional (but highly recommended) tool for extra help practicing musicianship skills. The software can be purchased online for US\$40 (download the free demo version first to test it out). Possibly better than practicing with a human, which is another recommended option.
- (d) The **teoría** website. <http://www.teoria.com/> Access this website for supplementary exercises, tutorials, reference, and articles for both ear training and music theory skills.
