2. Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Compose phrases in the 4-part chorale-style of the mid-18th century, and complete a written score capturing these phrases in detail.
- 2. Compose an SATB harmonization effecting modulation from any diatonic key to any diatonic key, and complete a written score capturing all musical details of the composition.
- 3. Work effectively in composition and analysis with elementary chromatic harmonies including "Neapolitan" chords, augmented 6th chords, common-tone chords, altered triads, and extended chords.
- 4. Analyze and extrapolate compositional methodologies from sonata form, sonata-rondo form, and variation forms.

3. Required Materials:

- (a) Texts. Theory and Analysis, 2nd edition, J. P. Clendinning & E. W. Marvin, Pub. Norton
- (b) Other. three ring binder, 10 plain dividers, music manuscript, pencil, pens, eraser, straight edge

4. Course Content and Schedule:

The course will be intensive. You must keep up with the curriculum. Completion of the assignments is the responsibility of the student. Assignments must be handed in on time. Assignments handed in later than two weeks will not be marked.

Learning harmony is composing music. It is not an exercise. Skill is achieved the same as on your instrument or your voice, by regular practice. You cannot cram for a harmony examination.

Please note that classes are 1 hour & 20 minutes long. They begin promptly on the hour and end ten minutes before the half hour. If you have missed a lesson please check the board outside my office for your assignments. They will be posted immediately after the class. Do not ask for your missed assignments in the next class. Also, please do not ask the instructor to teach, for a second time, a lesson you have missed.

Completed assignments can be handed in at the next lesson, or dropped off outside my office in the Camosun Envelope. I usually mark on Wednesday mornings.

NB: You must learn to teach yourself. I will cover, in class, all the material necessary for the examinations. However, research beyond the classroom is vital if you are to thoroughly understand the language of music - the language in which you have chosen to express your deepest emotions.

Also, you will not be allowed to leave the room during an examination.

And, no cell phones ever, throw it away, it is bad for your creativity.

Please, no eating in class, munch, munch, munch... it is difficult to write music in a cafeteria.
