Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

1. Appraise a variety of teaching materials for potential effectiveness in supporting student learning through private instruction at the beginning and intermediate music levels.
2. List available print, electronic, and aural-tradition teaching material for use in private instruction at the beginning and intermediate music level, and design small-scale original materials to fill gaps in the existing material-base.
3. Create a curriculum from available and original materials to assist a beginning or intermediate student progress to the next level.
4. Assemble from available and original materials a balanced program of study, covering a range of styles and promoting a range of skills, for a beginning or intermediate private music student.

Week 1: Course Introduction. Setting best teaching practices and delivery approach
Week 2: Evaluating a new student for current repertoire level, interests, and goals
Week 3: Evaluating materials and repertoire for student use
Week 4: Materials, repertoire and associated teaching strategies - first weeks
Week 5: Building a curriculum for the first weeks of study
Week 6: Materials, repertoire and associated teaching strategies - novice level
Week 7: Building a curriculum for the novice levels
Week 8: Instilling the basics of musical style using novice level repertoire
Week 9: Cultivating an ideal of tone colour for use in music making
Week 10: Reading music beyond the basics of pitch and rhythm
Week 11: Materials, repertoire and associated teaching strategies - early-intermediate levels
Week 12: Building a curriculum for the early-intermediate levels
Week 13: Developing ideas of musical style using early-intermediate level repertoire
Week 14: Introducing elements of period style to early-intermediate students
Week 15: Final Examination

## 5. Basis of Student Assessment:

1. Attendance and class participation (20\%) - average of weekly marks; no make-up of missed class sessions; approved, documented absences are dropped from the average with remaining session taking a greater weighting.
2. Assignments and Group work (30\%) - approximately 12 assigned through each term
3. Quizzes (10\%) - scheduled (minimum one week's notice) and impromptu (no make-up except for approved absences). Up to 8 per term.
4. Term Project or Paper ( $20 \%$ ) - One or both assigned each term; assigned with minimum 4 weeks' notice: details to follow from individual instructor
5. Term Final Examination (20\%) - One per term, delivered in two parts: written and practical demonstration one-on-one or in group setting: details to follow from individual instructor, minimum 6 weeks before scheduled examination
