5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) Seminar worksheets 10% During each seminar students will be asked to complete a short assignment based on the week's seminar reading. These will be turned in at the end of each seminar and graded on a pass/fail basis. The best 10 will form the grade for this portion of the course. No rewrites or deferrals. Further details will be distributed each seminar meeting. Reading the seminar reading assignment is essential preparation.
- (b) Case study analyses 20% (4 at 5% each) One assignment/interval on a case study drawn from the selection of cases in the chapters we are studying during the interval. First Interval: Oct 12 & 19; Second Interval: Nov 2 and 9; Third Interval Nov 16 & 23; Fourth interval Nov 30 & Dec 7. No rewrites or deferrals. Further details on D2L.

Temporary Description

ı	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
