2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Use a variety of tenses and nuanced vocabulary to communicate in Spanish at a beginner level.
- 2. Respond spontaneously and competently in everyday situations and express ideas and opinions in discussions.
- 3. Demonstrate comprehension of select visual media samples through writing and conversation.
- 4. Demonstrate beginner-level knowledge of the cultures of the Hispanic world, film-specific vocabulary and particular periods in Spanish-language film.

5. Course Structure

In this course, students will expand their comprehension and communication skills by watching Spanish-language films and engaging in conversational activities relevant to the content. Students will observe the language in its natural context, listen to a variety of accents, and continue learning colloquial expressions. Combining in-class and at-home viewing, students watch approximately seven full-length films from several countries of origin, each one increasingly more difficult.

Prior to viewing each film, students study and complete vocabulary exercises, as well as read in advance any questions and conversation themes they will be expected to comment on after the film. Lecture will include new vocabulary, any challenging grammar points in the film and the cultural context of the film. Students are expected to incorporate these new items into their oral discussion and written assignments.

After viewing the films, students will approach the content through a variety of oral comprehension activities in class. Students may also be asked to research particular cultural points in advance and share their findings orally.

Students can expect to complete all the readings and some of the chapter writing assignments in addition to a short film review of each movie. In pairs or individually, students will also conduct one oral presentation to the class, in Spanish, based on a topic of cultural interest relevant to one of the films studied.

6. Course Requirements

Your work will be assessed in terms of the following grading breakdown:

<u>Homework</u> – (10% of final grade)

Assignments from textbook. Completion will be assessed at random.

Participation and preparation for class – (25%)

Because this is a conversation course, attendance will be monitored and your active participation in all class discussions is imperative. This means coming to class prepared to answer predetermined discussion questions using chapter vocabulary and concepts, and then sharing your opinions and findings with others in a balanced and thoughtful manner. Students can expect to be continuously evaluated on their daily participation and their improvement in oral and communicative proficiency.

Quizzes – (15%)

One vocabulary quiz per film.

Presentation – (10%)

One oral presentation: In pairs or alone, present on a cultural topic relevant to a film we are watching in class. Sign-up sheet will be posted outside my office door (Young 312).

<u>Film commentaries</u> – (25% of final grade) Submit one written commentary per film. Instructions to follow.

<u>Final Paper</u> – (15%) Compare one of the films discussed in class with a film of your choice (with instructor's prior approval). Hand in during final exam week.

Note: The writing is expected to be ORIGINAL and completed without online translators or proofreading by anyone else. Work that suggests the use of external help will not be accepted. Furthermore, using translation programs or having another person do this writing assignment constitutes cheating.
