## Assignments

<u>Labs</u> (20%): a total of 3 labs will be assigned during the semester. Each lab will carry equal marks. All labs are to be submitted as scheduled (see schedule of activities). Students can work individually or in small group of 2 but must form a new group each time or they will not receive marks. Students who did not attend the lab session will not be allowed to participate in any groups. Late labs are subject to a penalty of 2% per day and will not be accepted after one week.

Term Paper and Outline (30%): Students are required to conduct research on the contemporary development issues facing one or more the Asia-Pacific countries. All paper topics have to be approved by the instructor. An outline of the paper (5%) has to be submitted for approval (see schedule for due day). The completed paper (25%), with no more than 2,000 words, should be typewritten and submitted as scheduled. Late papers will not be accepted unless prior

- **approval** by the instructor is obtained. Marks for late papers are to be deducted by two percent per day.
- Oral Presentation (10%): Each student is expected to give a 10-15 minutes summary of his/her term paper. Schedule will be assigned by instructor.
- <u>In-class Participation</u> (5%): In-class participation is an essential part of the course. Students are expected to participate in class activities and discussions and answer questions in-class or on-line (by using D2L).

## **Tests**

- <u>Test 1</u> (17.5%): The first test will be based on the reading and lecture materials covered in the first half of the course. See course schedule for details.
- <u>Test 2</u> (17.5%): Test 2 will be based on the reading and lecture materials covered since Test 1. See course schedule for test date.
- <u>Important Note</u>: A doctor's certificate or equivalent is required to take a supplementary examination. Other supplementary examinations <u>approved</u> by the instructor may be subjected to a penalty of 2% per day.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 <sup>rd</sup> course attempt or at the point of course completion.)

Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
