4. Course Content and Schedule

Week 1: Main Principles for teaching piano to beginners.

- Week 2: Piano Methods critical analyses.
- Week 3: Piano Methods comparative analyses of method books
- Week 4: Solving specific issues.
- Week 5: Developing listening skills, ease of movement and sound
- Week 6: Repertoire from preparatory to upper beginner
- Week 7: Etudes and exercises, technical requirements from elementary to upper beginner (Czerny, Berens, Nikolaev)
- Week 8: Early mid-intermediate level students further exploration.
- Week 9: How to choose repertoire for certain pedagogical goals.
- Week 10: Tools for honing dynamic range, memorization, technique, sound and articulation
- Week 11: Building student's independence.
- Week 12: Cultivating a sense of form and introducing students to styles and time periods
- Week 13: The Music Teacher persona
- Week 14: Summary of the course, preparing for Examination.
- Week 15: Final Examination

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) Assignments and Group Work (30%): based on submitted work and preparation, approximately 12 assigned throughout the term
- (b) Attendance and Class Participation (30%): based on attendance and average of weekly marks; no make-up of missed class sessions; approved, documented absences are dropped from the average with remaining session taking a greater weighting.
- (c) Final Exam (40%): One per term, details to follow from individual instructor, minimum 6 weeks before scheduled examination

Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3^{rd} course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
cw	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
