5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will practice the four proficiencies: writing, reading, speaking, and listening in French. Active participation during class time and active learning outside class are very important to students' own learning experience but to their partners as well because many activities will be conducted in pairs or in small groups. Students will have then to prepare activities out of class for the purpose of practicing with efficiently.

Activities in class and assignments (10%+25%)

Many activities will be done in class in small groups. While some will be simple practice, others will be evaluated based on the quality of answers and participation (i.e., engagement). Therefore, it is very important to be present in class. The evaluated activities have been already scheduled (see the calendar) and they will be announced one week prior to the evaluation. These activities must be completed in class. Students will receive feedback on these evaluated activities. In addition, students will be asked to complete out of class assignments. These assignments **must be completed individually** by the due date at the beginning of each class. Late assignments, including after class, will lose 15% per day unless accompanied by medical documentation of illness. Assignments more than five days late (including weekends) will not be accepted.

Oral tests (dialogues and monologues) (10%+15%)

Students will prepare and present in pairs dialogue and monologue based on the topics seen in class. The presentation **must be entirely created by the student(s)** without the help of software or other persons. The objective of this activity is to encourage students' learning while expressing their creativity through conversation. Students will have to show their progress by submitting their dialogues to the instructor before the oral tests in order to receive feedback on grammar, syntax, vocabulary before the oral tests. Students are also welcomed to meet the teacher in order to practice their oral expression (pronunciation, rhythm, and intonation).

Tests (10%+15%+15%)

Students will have to complete three tests that include listening, reading, writing, and grammar. The final test will be completed in class before the examination period.

Illness, accident and family affliction are the only legitimate reasons to miss an evaluated activity in class or an exam (tests and dialogues). The teacher reserves the right to require a doctor's note if a student is absent due to illness. Students who are absent the day a test is given are expected to contact the teacher prior to the exam.

Remember: It is your responsibility to find out from colleagues what class work, announcements or assignments you have missed while absent, as well as to check the D2L for this course periodically.

Note: Cheating and plagiarism

The assessments, orals, and tests must be completed without any translators or proofreading (speaking) by anyone else. Work that suggests the use of external help will not be accepted. Using translator programs or having another person do your assignments, your tests, or create your oral dialogues constitutes **cheating**.

Also, copying an entire assignments (including dialogues) or representing specific passages as if they are students own words is **plagiarism**.

Temporary Grade	Description
