COURSE OUTLINE

This course adopts primarily a thematic approach to the study of physical and human geography of British Columbia. Beginning with a regional overview and introduction to geographic concepts, we will then move to discuss the physical processes that produced the spectacular landscape and resources of the province. Topics include an overview of the province's physiographic and climate regions and historical geography. We will focus on the region's economic and resource geography and finish with an overview of contemporary issues such as urbanization, economic development, and resource management.

2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Distinguish between regional and topical geography.
2. Use appropriate techniques and information sources in the geographic study of British Columbia.
3. Describe the physical and human geography of British Columbia.
4. Describe and analyze, using geographic themes and approaches, topics related to the Geography of British Columbia, such as resource management and use, settlement patterns and development, and regional identities and issues.

3. Required Materials

This text is available in the bookstore. There should be plenty of used copies around. The text is used at UVic as well. There also will be a reserve copy in the library.

4. Course Content and Schedule

- **Lectures:** Attendance is essential. I will post basic lecture outlines on D2L: online.camosun.ca. These outlines are no substitute for coming to class! This class has two four-hour blocks and will *generally* follow a format of having one lecture and one lab each week. Consult the course schedule for further details.
- **Readings:** are an essential part of this course – they provide depth and context that are indispensable to your understanding of the course material, and they will be tested. Specific reading assignments are detailed below; these may be modified as the term goes on.
- **Assignments:** A variety of assignments must be completed for this class. The assignment due date will be at the beginning the subsequent lab period, unless otherwise instructed. Lab assignments must be handed in as a hardcopy. Emailed assignments will not be accepted. I reserve the right to impose a 10% per day penalty on late assignments. Late assignments will not be accepted after I have returned them marked. Anyone cheating or copying work will receive a mark of zero on the assignment.
 - **Lab Exercises:** Lab will be worked on in class. Consult course schedule for details. One lab period will be dedicated to conducting a self-guided field trip of downtown Victoria. Details will be discussed in class. Some personal time may be required to complete the exercise.
 - **Visual Methods exercises Presentation:** You will prepare a short paper and deliver a 3-5 minute presentation summarizing one aspect of the course that most interests you. The assignment employs visual methods as a geographic research technique using an existing or personal photograph as a frame of reference for the topic presented. Details of the assignment will be discussed in class.
- **Exams:** There will be two exams. The format for these will be a combination of multiple choice, short answer and long answer questions. They mainly will emphasize the lecture material, though lab material will also be drawn upon. The second exam will NOT be cumulative.
- **Illness, etc.:** If you miss a lab or exam due to illness or some other serious reason, I must ask you to provide a doctor's note or other documentation to support your story. Otherwise, a mark of zero for the missed assignment will be given. Exams and assignments are hard to reschedule, so try not to miss them unless you are too sick to perform at a normal level.

Students who miss an exam for a valid reason **must** contact me **within 24 hours** with an explanation. In such cases, one makeup exam time will be scheduled, and all students needing it will be expected to attend.

- **Instructor Absence:** In the event of instructor absence, every effort will be taken to ensure a sustained quality of instruction. I will provide as much notice as possible, but please note that this is not always possible in the case of illness. Occasionally, administrative duties might require me to be absent from class. In these cases, as much notice as possible will be given and suitable alternatives to our regular class meeting will be presented to students ahead of time (i.e. pre-recorded lectures, invited speaker, or an on-line module).
- **Course Schedule:** Will be provided on the first day of class.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
