5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Assignments

- Important Note: Students are expected to complete their own labs, term paper and other assignments. Copying answers or using works from others are not permitted. In small group assignments, all students are expected to participate and contribute towards the completion of the assignment. Students found violating the Academic Conduct Policy will be assigned an F for the assignment or the course.
- <u>Lab Exercises</u> (27%): a total of 3 labs will be assigned during the semester. Each lab carries equal marks. See Schedule of Activities for their due days. Late labs are not accepted.
- <u>Term Paper and Outline (25%)</u>: Students are encouraged to form a small group of 2 or individually to conduct research on an economic geographical issue. Possible paper topics will be provided at the beginning of the course. An outline of the proposal need to be submitted for approval by the instructor (5%). The completed paper (20%), with no more than 2,000 words (8 to 10 double-spaced pages), should be typewritten and submitted by the due day (see schedule of activities). Late papers will not be accepted unless prior **approval** by the instructor is obtained. Marks for late papers are to be deducted by two percent per day.
- <u>Oral Presentation (8%)</u>: all students are expected to present their papers in the last two weeks of classes. Instructor will schedule the presentations accordingly.
- <u>In-class Participation</u> **(5%)**: Participation is an essential part of the course. Students are expected to participate in class activities and discussions and answer questions in-class or on-line (by using D2L).

Tests

- <u>Test 1</u> (17.5%): The first test will be held in week 7 and based on the reading, lecture, and lab materials covered in the first six weeks of the course.
- <u>Test 2</u> (17.5%): Test 2 will be held in class (see schedule of activities) and based on the reading, lecture, and lab materials

covered since Test 1.

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
