A quiz (written and listening comprehension) will be given after completing each Chapter (four in total)

Oral Interview/ Speech Presentation

There are two parts. One is to make a 3-minute speech (20 sentences) and answer some questions based on what he/she presents. The other is to answer 10 questions out of the 100 sample questions to be covered during the lab hours.

Big Quiz 1 (Mid-term)/ Big Quiz 2 (Final)

Two Big Quizzes will be given. The Big Quiz 1 will cover L5 and L6 and the Big Quiz 2 will mainly cover L7 and L8.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) Assignments 4% (1% x 4=4%)
- (b) Quizzes 40% (Written 6% x 4=24%; Listening 4% x 4=16%)
- (c) Big Quizzes 30% (15% x 2=30%)
- (d) Recitation 8% (2% x four recitations)
- (e) Oral Interview 6%
- (f) Speech 6% (about 3-minute speech; 20 sentences minimum)
- (g) Participation 6% (0.5 will be deducted for each absence)

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
