2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

1. *Describe the nature of political science, including key concepts: politics, governments, states, political cultures, and ideologies.*
2. *Identify basic governmental structures and processes: constitutions, federal and unitary systems, parliamentary and presidential systems, elections, politics and governance at the world level.*
3. *Identify basic political actors: political parties, interest groups, social movements, and the news media.*
4. *Describe the relationship between politics and the economy, the value of democracy (in both the developed and developing nations), and the future of politics at the world level.*
5. *Critically evaluate some aspect of political life. (Topics may change from semester to semester, but could consist of such things as democracy, human rights, civil disobedience, social democracy, political radicalism, etc.)*

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Marks will be determined on the basis of the following work:

1. Reading Quizzes: 10% (1.1% per quiz)

With each new chapter students will be asked to take an online multiple choice quiz that accompanies the textbook. The quizzes will cover the reading for a chapter and must be completed **prior** to the start of that week's class. Students may take each quiz twice. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start of that class – Mondays at 1:30 PM.

2. Short Essays: 30% (10% per assignment)

Students (individually or as part of a group) will write a minimum of three short essays of approximately 250 words each. A choice of four questions will be posted at the start of each section. Students / groups will choose from one of the four questions. Students or groups may submit up to four SEs with the three highest grades counting towards their final grade. Papers should be just as well-crafted as a standard essay. Late assignments will be penalized 10% per day. For more information, see the Assignment section of the D2L content page.

3. Thought Bubble Project: 25% (12.5% Individual submission, 12.5% Group submission)

Students will register (through the D2L) into one of six groups. Student, individually, will submit a 360° image (via Google Cardboard Camera app) and craft a short description of how the image captures the idea. As a group, students will select one 360° image that best represents the complexity of the idea they wish to explain. Groups will then add additional images, in image textboxes, sounds, and potentially video to craft an interactive thought bubble. Students will attend two prep days and a presentation day (all days mandatory in order to receive full marks for this part of the project). The presentation day will occur on Friday May 25th. 4. Engagement Grade - 5%

All students will be asked to make a meaningful contribution to class activities and demonstrate engagement with topic. There are numerous ways for students to express their engagement. See the D2L site for a full account of participation grading.

5. Take Home Final – 30%

A final exam will consist of two take home essays due at **noon** on Thursday May 31st. Individual students will have **72 hours** to compose two essays of approximately 500 words in length. Students will answer two short essay questions (from a choice of six) which draws from themes covered since the beginning of the semester. Two separate essays will be submitted through the course's Drop box. For more information, see the Assignment section of the D2L content page.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
