7. Recommended Materials to Assist Students to Succeed Throughout the Course

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty means completing all your academic work without

- Copying another person's work or taking credit for ideas that aren't your own (plagiarizing)
- Inappropriately sharing (cheating) or falsifying information (deceitful)

Examples of academic honesty include:

- Submitting your own work that you have done completely by yourself
- Giving credit and stating clearly any passages or material from other sources including electronic, printed or multimedia material that help support your work
- Giving full credit to others including peers if you have collaborated on an instructor approved collaboration or group project
- Not Giving credit to group members including ones-self, who have not fully participated in an assignment or project
- Not re-using --- previous course work, assignments or research for a project or course without the express permission of your current instructor
- Writing exams unaided by materials like notes, text messages or friends unless expressly approved in advance by the instructor
- Taking all exams as scheduled except in emergency circumstances as per the college final exam policy.
- Not letting a colleague have access to your online courses or other college accounts

Best practices:

- Use only access codes, passwords and logins issued to you and not to others
- Let an instructor know if you need help or do not understand the course material
- If you need something in an exam, or if you aren't sure of your work in relation to a project, or if someone has asked for your help in doing an assignment and you aren't clear on how far to go, then you need to connect with your instructor and clarify

What is Academic Dishonesty?

There are four main areas that make up academic dishonesty:

- Cheating
- Plagiarism
- Data Misrepresentation
- Providing fraudulent information for any purpose

Cheating

Cheating is defined as intentionally and knowingly using any unauthorized material, information, or knowledge in order to complete an assignment, exam or project. This behaviour could include:

- taking unauthorized notes into an exam
- copying from another student's paper
- having someone else take an exam for you
- using another individual's previously marked assignment from an earlier class and adapting it as your own
- communicating the contents of an exam to anyone who has not yet written it
- situations where others might influence you to be dishonest
- occasions where you knowingly let people cheat off you or make it easy to do so

Plagiarism

As per Camosun policy, plagiarism includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- submitting an entire assignment written by someone else
- incorporating or paraphrasing passages from other works or an internet site without citations
- submitting an assignment that an editor or tutor has partially or entirely rewritten for you
- submitting any portion of a group project which contains plagiarism

Data Misrepresentation

• Reporting or falsifying results that you did not obtain

- Factual misrepresentation such as using uncited material as scholarly
- Using partial information or material taken out of context

Providing fraudulent information for any purpose

• Falsely providing medical or other information to gain an academic advantage

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
