5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Course requirements (see schedule of activities for due days):

- **Project Proposals (15%):** a draft is to be submitted (one page) for feedback and a final proposal is to be submitted by week 5 (2 -3 pages). Submit one proposal per group.
- **2 Reflective Journals (30%):** two 1-2 page journal reports are to be submitted individually on-line.
- Individual participation (10%): each individual's roles and tasks in the project and their participation in class discussions

- Service Learning Activity Report (25%): to be submitted by each group in the form of powerpoint.
- Oral presentation (10%): each group will present their final report on the last day of class
- External Review Report (10%): will be included in the assessment of your overall performance when available. In the absence of an external review report, the grade will be adjusted based on all assignments.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description	
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
