2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Outline the concepts of globalization and its geographic patterns and impacts.
- 2. Assess the global linkages of trade, investment, transportation and communications, and migration.
- 3. Describe and compare the cultural and economic relationship among core, peripheral, and semi-peripheral regions.
- 4. Identify and explain the disparities in social, economic, and technological development in developed and less developed countries.
- 5. Evaluate global and local impacts on the environment in selected world regions.

3. Required Materials

(a) Text: World Regional Geography Concepts 3rd Edition. By Lynda Mihelic Pulsipher and Alex Pulsipher. WH Freeman, New York, 2015. This text is **OPTIONAL**.

4. Course Content and Schedule

<u>Lectures</u>: There will be up to four hours of lecture per week. The whiteboard will be heavily utilized and digital images will augment the traditional lecture style. I am choosing to structure this course along five themes: population & gender, environmental issues, politics & power, development & globalization, and urbanization and with eleven regions to cover, we're going to need the time.

<u>Bag o'Tricks</u>: To spare us all from four hours of lecturing a week, I've come up with an idea I'm calling the Bag o'Tricks. At the start of class, I will put a bag on the table. If this is the week that you have spare time, extra energy, or you just love the region we're covering, you'll drop in a piece of paper into the bag with your name on it. At the next class, you'll have time to present a facet of the region – something you find interesting about the area. You'll have to do this once during the term to get your 2% but you have the option to do this up to five times during the term. Each Trick you bag over the mandatory one will shift 2% off your final project; and, if you do all five, you'll be exempted from the final project.

<u>Assignments</u>: There are ten assignments in the course all of which focus on specific facets of each of the regions we cover. You'll be given a week, usually, to complete a series of questions that pertain to a topic or a locale. Computer access will be required for most of the assignments as you will be referring you to a variety of websites and data sources. Late submissions will not be accepted once marked assignments have been handed back unless an alternate arrangement has been made.

<u>Travel Itinerary Project</u>: You will be asked to create a detailed travel itinerary. This will likely be a portfolio submission that contains maps, schedules, travel routings and destination descriptions. I will provide you with the routing for your hypothetical trip – a trip that must be overland and not use air travel. You will decide upon a theme for the trip: architecture, cultural markets, language or religious diversity, national parks, resource industries, etc. and you will plan and describe the best way to pursue this theme in your region. This assignment is worth 8% of your final grade and should not be underestimated. As stated earlier, you have the option to do five Bag o'Tricks over the term and, if you do, you will no longer be required to do this assignment.

<u>Tests</u>: There will be three tests this term, the first one on **Thursday**, **October 4**th and the second on **Thursday**, **November 8**th and the third on **Thursday**, **December 6**th. Each test will have a selection of short-answer, multiplechoice, and short essay-type questions. Attendance is mandatory and illness must be declared <u>before</u> the exam begins and confirmed with a doctor's note for a re-sit to be possible. There is no final exam during Exam Week for this course.

<u>D2L</u>: I use D2L, a learning support software, extensively in this course. It is a fairly user-friendly site that allows you to access lecture notes, hand in your assignments digitally, track your mark, and be alerted to upcoming due dates or changes in assignments. I strongly encourage you to use this support site for this course.
