2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will:

1. Increase vocabulary to 200 Kanji and 1000 words.
2. Be able to express his/her own desires and intentions in plain Japanese.

3. Required Materials

- (a) Texts: An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese, Genki I, The Japan Times, Second Edition
- (b) Other: An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese, Genki I, Workbook I, The Japan Times, Second Edition

4. Course Content and Schedule

JAPN 200 is designed for students who have completed JAPN 100 and 101, or for those with an equivalent knowledge. This course will build on what the students have learned and further their skills in writing, reading, speaking and listening. The students are expected to start writing a longer passages to express their thoughts in Japanese. Grammar and vocabulary will be continuously introduced in the context of text dialogues. JAPN 200 will cover Genki I (Lesson 9 to 12).

Assignments (see page 4)

There are four assignments in total, worth 3% each. Hardcopy of assignments will be given in class, and the due dates are indicated on the course schedule found on page 4, unless otherwise informed. Assignments must be completed by the student and individually (work that is copied, done by on-line translation program, etc will receive 0%). **A late submission will lose 1% per day.**

Chapter Written & Listening Quizzes

A quiz will be given after completing each chapter. Four quizzes are planned. Each quiz consists of two parts, written and the listening comprehension. It is worth 6% and 4% respectively.

Big Quizzes

There are 2 Big Quizzes: Big Quiz 1 (L9-10), Big Quiz 2 (11-12). Each is worth 15% each.

Individual (or pair) Oral Presentation

Each student will perform either a solo oral presentation or a skit performance as a pair. The procedure will be discussed in class. (6%)

In Class Composition

Each student will write a composition in class. The details will be discussed in class. (6%)

Attendance

Missing a class (lecture or lab) results in 0.5 deduction each time from the attendance/participation score.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- a) Quizzes and Exams must be taken at the scheduled time. There will be no "make-up". Exceptions are granted for only serious illness or other extenuating circumstances (e.g. Accidents, Family affliction etc). **In the case of an emergency, please inform your instructor immediately**. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
