2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- Perform basic mixing techniques on recorded digital audio material to produce a recording appropriate for portfolio presentation.
- Apply basic techniques of music editing in the production of an audio recording appropriate for portfolio presentation.
- 3. Apply EQ (equalization) sampled and algorithmic reverberation in the production of a finished recording appropriate for portfolio presentation.
- 4. Complete the process of producing and delivering a basic audio recording in contemporary delivery format.
- 5. Discuss the attributes and applications of a variety of digital audio mixing and editing software programs in their application to professional and academic settings.

3. Required Materials

- (a) Texts: D2L contains all course texts or provides links to sites with the relevant materials.
- (b) Other: Computer (Mac or PC), Audio/MIDI interface, loudspeakers or headphones, Reaper (software)

4. Course Content and Schedule

Dates: September 4 - December 10, final project submission: December 10 – 17.

Location: D2L online platform
Class Times: Weekly modules

This course is completely delivered online through D2L. Throughout the semester, a new module will be made available at the beginning of every week. Each module contains text, videos, quizzes, listening quizzes, and assignments which have to be completed before accessing the next module.

Technical Ear Training: In addition to practical exercises and quizzes, technical ear training is an essential part of the course. In order to develop technical listening skills, you are required to practice with the introduced software modules on a regular basis and to complete all listening quizzes. Please note that listening skills develop over time, so the more regular you practice, the greater your progress.

Deadlines: You are expected to complete one module each week of the semester and to submit the assignments by the stated deadline in order to receive full credit. Late submission will be accepted with a late penalty of 2% of the given mark for each day an assignment is submitted late. Please try to submit all assignments on time as the assignments progress in complexity and build upon each other. If you have any questions or problems with any of the assignments, please contact your instructor as soon as possible.

Discussions: Towards the second half of the semester, you will critique each other's mixes. Your credit for participation will be based on your activity within the discussions.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

- (a) Assignments: Assignments are designed to apply concepts to the basic mixing of music within a DAW. In order to pass the course, every assignment has to be submitted within the provided timeframe. (20% of course mark)
- (b) Quizzes: Regular guizzes test the comprehension of discussed theory and concepts. (20% of course mark)
- (c) Technical Listening: Technical listening quizzes will test the ability of frequency band recognition. The quizzes will gradually increase in complexity throughout the semester. Every listening quiz has to be taken before the next module becomes available. (20% of course mark)
- (d) Participation: Your participation in the discussion of mixes. (20% of course mark)
- (e) Final project: The final project is a complete mix of a medium-sized music production. This project will have to be submitted by the last day of classes. (20% of course mark)

Temporary Grade	Description
