2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Write short two-part musical phrases using elementary principals of species counterpoint.
- 2. Improvise SATB simple diatonic harmonisations using accepted principals of voice-leading and capture these harmonisations in both open and closed score.
- 3. Demonstrate the function of individual triads and seventh chords in progression within a diatonic key.
- 4. Modulate to the dominant key using secondary dominants and diminished chords
- 5. Work into and out of figured bass and Roman numeral notation with ease, and establish relationship of the same with lead-sheet and root-quality chord notation.
- 6. Analyze and extrapolate compositional methodologies from simple binary and ternary forms.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Week 1: Advanced rudiments/Introduction to Tonal harmony review

Week 2: Species counterpoint, non-chord tones

Week 3: Dominant seventh chords, inversions of V7, diminished triad,

Week 4: Functions of secondary triads, six-four cadential, cadences (authentic, plagal, half, deceptive)

Week 5: Open and closed score harmonization: harmonization of seventh chords, auxiliary/passing six-four chords

Week 6: Musical phrases and periods, introduction to melodic writing

Week 7: Review, Midterm Exam (subject to change)

Week 8: (vii^o7) half diminished sevenths and inversions of vii^o7, secondary dominants

Week 9: Modulation from the tonic to dominant key in a musical period

Week 10: Simple binary forms, introduction to melodic and rhythmic embellishment in two-voice compositions as a class project

Week 11: Ternary forms

Week 12: Continuation of weeks 10 and 11

Week 13: Perform two-voice composition projects in class and review

Week 14: Last week of review before final exam

Temporary Grade	Description
