Classes comprise lectures and seminar work. Seminar work includes discussions, activities, assignments, and student presentations. **DOING THE ASSIGNED READING BEFORE CLASS WILL HELP IN THE UNDERSTANDING OF LECTURES AND DISCUSSIONS. ASSIGNED READING IS PERTINENT TO DOING WELL ON CHAPTER REVIEWS**

***Three exams:**

Comprise multiple choices, true and false, short answer and essay. Exams require you to apply the terms and concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions. The scores on all three quizzes will comprise **54%** of course grade. Each exam is worth **18%**. **EXAMS ARE NOT ACCUMULATIVE**. Please refer to handout distributed in class for details. **There will be no make-up opportunities for an exam missed without a medical note.**

Chapter Reviews:

Comprise multiple choice and true and false questions on material covered on chapter readings and in class notes. The purpose is to ensure the student remains current with course material. **Each review is worth 2% each and there are 8 total.**

The best 7 out of 8 chapter reviews graded for 14%. There are **NO make-up Chapter Reviews**. Full seminar attendance is required to write each chapter review.

1. **Individual research power point on a Contemporary Issue:** In teams of three, each student is to choose one of biological/psychological/social cultural perspective and research a contemporary issue from this perspective. **Individually**, the topic is developed and written as a power point presentation. This assignment is worth **20%**. **Each student submits a hard copy of: power point presentation, a title page, a referenced ten fact sheet, a full peer reviewed research article, and a reference page written in APA 6th edition. Please refer to APA sample provided in class. Students are responsible for their own written submission graded out of 50 points. DUE NOVEMBER 01**
2. **Following written submission date, groups of three reconvene to delivery research material. Each member shares his or her work with a small group of peers for five minutes. An audience involvement activity is required. This audience involvement activity requires active audience engagement for 3 to 5 minutes.**

ATTENDANCE MATTERS-PARTICIPATION 50 points = 12 percentage

Lecture attendance and in class assignments are part of your participation. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to contact other students in order to catch up on any missed material.

There are NO make -up opportunities for assignments missed. Be sure to inform me of your absence by email or voicemail; with medical documentation an excused absence is granted and any one of the three exams rescheduled.

Late or Missed Work:

STUDENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Reading the assigned material is required, prior to class, in order to prepare for tests and to participate in class discussions and group tasks. Attendance is essential since key concepts covered in the lectures many not be in the course readings. Research project, chapter reviews, and three exams are required for student to meet learning outcomes. **There are NO extra assignments or exams offered for grade improvement.**
2. A student contacts the instructor with medical documentation, within three days of the missed assignment or quiz, if wanting to make up chapter reviews and exams. If students decide to miss classes then they are responsible for ensuring that they understand all materials and they are aware of any announcements, including those that may alter future course events.
3. Any work that is copied, plagiarized, or fabricated will automatically receive an "F" grade. All work submitted is referenced applying APA guidelines and includes a title page running head, short title, page number, long title, student name, and course.
4. **Please note all due dates.** Two mark per day penalty applies to all late submissions without granted extensions. If a missed class, discuss notes with a fellow student first before contacting instructor. Questions on any assignment or exam contact instructor first before a fellow student.

STUDENT STUDY TECHNIQUES: There are 6 phases for effective studying (PQ4R)

1. **Preview:** Scan chapter titles, subtitles, and chapter summary before reading the chapter
2. **Question:** formulate questions from the textbook, lecture notes using headings and subheadings. Use on line glossary and flash cards to define terminology and concepts
3. **Read:** be sure to read theories and concepts to compare and contrast similarities and differences between the bio-psychosocial perspectives. An example, how does psychoanalytic theory compare to the cognitive social learning theory? Keep your questions in mind and do not skip graphs, boxes, tables etc.
4. **Retrieve:** prepare to come to lecture asking questions after you test yourself multiple times. If uncomfortable asking questions in class than email questions or book a time to see instructor. Also self-testing is available on the free book companion website (www.worthpublishers.com/myers).
5. **Review:** Create a summary covering all your questions and answers. Complete chapter reviews and list all the key terms and operationally define.
6. **Read:** read the chapter a second time, following class/seminar. Reading the chapter for any missed detail in order to apply your conceptual understanding using examples.

7. Recommended for Successful Course Performance:

1. Study Guide Questions on each chapter posted on D2L
2. Form study groups to discuss material, design questions, and apply personal examples to content covered.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades assigned for specific circumstances convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

Final Grades:

Final grades that end with a decimal point of 0.5 or above round to the next higher whole number, and grades that end with a decimal point below 0.5 round to the next lowest whole number.
