ASSIGNMENTS DESCRIPTION

1. EXAMS 60%

1. First mid-term: 20%

The exams will consist of some combination of true/false statements, fill-in the blank, multiple choice, short answer questions, and short essay responses. The format of each exam such as the number of questions will be discussed in class.

2. Quizzes: 10%

The quizzes questions will be primarily based on the assigned readings. The questions will consist of few multiple questions, or short answer questions, or a combination of both. Throughout the term, we will have **5 RANDOM QUIZZES**, each quiz weigh 2% of the total mark. Online submissions WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. If you miss a guiz, you must provide a doctor's note to be eligible for a deferred exam/quiz.

3. Final exam: 30%

The final exam will be 30% cumulative; emphasis will be more on materials covered after the Mid-term. More specific guidance regarding the cumulative portion of the final exam will be provided during the last week of class (Review class).

2. IN-CLASS GROUP ASSIGNMENTS: 15%

Throughout the term, we will have 7 in-class group assignments. The questions of each assignment will be based on the assigned readings, class lecture, and class discussions. Online submissions WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. If you miss a class, you must provide a doctor's note to be eligible to write a deferred exam question.

3. RESEARCH PAPER: 20%

The Purpose of this assignment is to give students the opportunity to gain the required skills to research, analyze and write academic papers. Students are to write analytical-research paper (6-8 page paper, 12 point font, double-spaced, times new roman, one inch margins) to explain/analyze the criminogenic factors that cause/correlate with A CRIMINAL/DEVIANT BEHAVIOR (violent crime, gangs/organized crime, property crime, white collar crime, corporate crime, youth crime/deviance, car theft/joy-riding, prostitution, drug abuse, ...etc. While all essays can draw on class readings. In particular, Part II of the book: Explanations of crime & criminal behavior) additional research is required. For this reason, the research paper must use at least four additional academic sources (academic articles and/or books).

Assignment Requirements: Your paper must include the following:

- Title Page (Title of your topic, name, student number, course name, and date).
- Introduction section which clearly describes the topic chosen and the purpose and structure of your paper (approximately 1-2 pages)
- Body/Content section that includes 4-6 main points related to the findings from your selected studies (approximately 3-4 pages)

- **Conclusion** section that synthesizes/summarizes the paper and draws any conclusions (approximately 0.5-1 page)
- References Page listing the resources that you cited in your paper. All students Must either use APA format, or Chicago Format for citation. You must be consistent, and use one format throughout the paper.

4. TED-TALKS IN THE CLASS: 5%

Every student will have 5-10 minutes to present the key ideas/findings of his/her research paper. Developing verbal communication and public speaking skills is crucial for your future academic and professional endeavors. This is a great learning opportunity to practice public speaking, and answer follow-up questions.

INSTRUCTIONAL POLICIES

All assignments submitted for evaluation must be original and produced for the purposes of this course only. All assignments must be prepared by each student individually, unless I have given permission for a group submission.
