2. Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe major contemporary issues in psychology and explain their historical antecedents.
- 2. Apply psychological theories and understanding of current psychological issues to personal experience.
- 3. Conduct impartial studies of psychological topics and arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Classes comprise lectures and seminar work. Seminar work includes discussions, activities, and assignments.

*Three exams:

Comprise multiple choices, true and false, short answer and essay. Exams require you to apply the terms and concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions. The scores on all three quizzes will comprise **54%** of course grade. Each exam is worth **18%**. **EXAMS ARE NOT** ACCUMULATIVE. Please refer to handout distributed in class for details. **There will be no make-up opportunities for exams missed. You must be available to write the exams. Vacations or scheduled flights are not considered emergencies.**

QUIZZES:

Comprise 17 multiple-choice questions and one short essay for 3 points, on material covered on chapter readings and in class notes. The purpose is to ensure the student remains current with course material. Each quiz is worth 2% each and there are 8 total. The best 7 out of 8 chapter reviews graded for 14%. There are NO make-up quizzes.

Two Assignments:

Students choose two of four topics to complete an assignment on. Please see assignment package distributed in class. **Each assignment is worth 10%.x2=20%.** A title page and reference page, written in APA and in word required. <u>Please refer to APA sample on psychology homepage.</u>

ATTENDANCE MATTERS-PARTICIPATION 25 points = 12%

Lecture attendance and in class activities are part of your participation. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to contact other students in order to catch up on any missed material. Assignments completed in class contribute toward participation grade. **There are NO make -up opportunities for assignments missed.**

All tests must be written during the scheduled times. In the event that you missed a test due to family emergency or illness, the weight of the test will be put on to another test, for example if exam one is missed=18% than exam two is 36%.

NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS accepted. Vacations or scheduled flights not considered emergencies.

Note: Recommended are two readings of each chapter: one reading prior to and following lecture. Please check timetable for readings assigned each week. Doing the assigned reading before class will help in understanding of lectures and reading the chapter following class contributes to doing well on the exams.

STUDENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Reading the assigned material is required, prior to class, in order to prepare for exams, participate in class discussions and complete in class assignments. Attendance is essential since key concepts covered in the lectures many not be in the course readings. All assignments, in class activities, quizzes, and three exams are required for completion for a student to be successful. Completion of in class assignments and attendance comprise the participation mark.
- 2. A student must keep any cell phone turned off and in a backpack while writing the exam.
- 3. All exams must be written during the scheduled times. In the event of a family emergency or illness, the 18% of exam is on the second exam, making the second or third exam worth 36%. This happens only by NOTIFIYING THE INSTRUCTOR BEFORE THE SCHEDULED EXAM. Students must be available to write the exams. Vacations or scheduled flights not considered as emergencies.
- 4. Any work that is copied, plagiarized, or fabricated will automatically receive an "F" grade. All work submitted is referenced applying APA guidelines and includes a title page running head, short title, page number, long title, student name, and course.

STUDENT STUDY TECNIQUES: There are 6 phases for effective studying (PQ4R)

- 1. Preview: Scan chapter titles, subtitles, and chapter summary before reading the chapter
- 2. **Question**: formulate questions from the textbook, lecture notes using headings and subheadings. Use on line glossary and flash cards to define terminology and concepts
- 3. Read: be sure to read theories and concepts to compare and contrast similarities and differences between the bio-psychosocial perspectives. An example, how does psychoanalytic theory compare to the cognitive social learning theory? Keep your questions in mind and do not skip graphs, boxes, tables etc.
- **4. Retrieve:** prepare to come to lecture asking questions after you test yourself multiple times.. If uncomfortable asking questions in class than email questions or book a time to see instructor. Also self-testing is available on the free book companion website (www.worthpublishers.com/myers).
- 5. **Review:** Create a summary covering all your questions and answers. Complete chapter reviews and list all the key terms and operationally define.
- 6. **Read:** read the chapter a second time, following class/seminar. Reading the chapter for any missed detail in order to apply your conceptual understanding using examples.

Chapter notes on D2L each week or purchase course pack at bookstore Study Guide Questions on each chapter posted on D2L Form study groups to discuss material, design questions, and apply personal examples to content covered.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
