2. Intended Learning Outcomes

There will be a mid- term exam 20%, second mid-term 20%, and a final exam 30%. The exams will consist of some combination of true/false statements, fill-in the blank, multiple choice, short answer questions, and short essay responses. More specific guidance will be provided during the designated class review.

Research paper

Students are to write analytical-research paper (3-8 page paper, 12 point font, double-spaced, times new roman, one inch margins) on one of the topics listed below. While all of these essays can draw on class readings, answers will require additional research. For this reason, the research paper must use at least **three additional academic sources (academic articles & books)**. All students Must either use <u>APA format</u>, or <u>Chicago Format</u> for citation. You must be consistent, and use one format throughout the paper.

- 1. Discuss policing approaches and current challenges that the police face in modern society.
- 2. Discuss the merits and challenges of restorative justice.
- 3. Discuss overrepresentation of Indigenous people in the criminal justice system.
- 4. Discuss the issue of murdered and missing indigenous women and girls.
- 5. Discuss search and seizure procedure in Canada.
- 6. Discuss legal defenses in the Criminal code of Canada. People are equal before the law, equality is not only in rights and obligations, but also, equality when they are a subject to law sanctions when they are convicted of committing an offensive actions. Nevertheless this concept has few exceptions. In some cases, and circumstances, offenders are excused for their criminal behaviors, or get a lenient or a decreased sanctions.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

1. Attendance and Participation

2. Late Penalty

All assignments must be completed and submitted by the date assigned (midnight maximum). All late written assignments will be penalized by 10% of the total mark per day.

3. Written Assignment Requirements

Written assignments for this course must be typewritten and double-spaced and follow the writing guide instructions. Written assignments must be submitted to the instructor at the beginning of class on the due date. Assignments received at the end of class, emailed, or not given directly to the instructor as noted may be penalized as defined under #2.

All assignments submitted for evaluation must be original and produced for the purposes of this course only. All assignments must be prepared by each student individually, unless I have given permission for a group submission.

4. Plagiarism

If you are concerned about your ability to properly credit and cite references, please see me ASAP. I am here to help you.

Plagiarism is considered a serious academic offense. If plagiarism is documented by your instructor, the penalty will be an automatic "0" for that assignment. A general rule to follow is that 5 or more consecutive words taken from a document or other source should either be placed in quotations and referenced appropriately, or, paraphrased and credited using a parenthetical citation.

5. Cheating/Academic Dishonesty/Student Conduct

7. Mark/Grade Challenges and Appeals

8.2. Excused absence due to illness. When students seek an excused absence because of illness, an official medical note is required.

8.3. Excused absence due to extenuating circumstances. In addition to illness, acceptable reasons for an excused absence are jury duty or court subpoena, death in the family, or other emergency approved by the Instructor.

It is the student's responsibility to keep up with class work when they are absent from class. Absence from class will not be accepted as a legitimate reason for failure to attend an exam on time.

Students must contact the instructor prior to missing an exam to determine whether they qualify for an excused absence.
