Plagiarism

Plagiarism is when you fail to fully and accurately acknowledge the sources of ALL the information in your assignments; the problem is that you give the impression that this is your own work. For example, if you quote something (word for word) but fail to put it in quotation marks or properly reference the citation to the author, then you are plagiarizing. Another example is if you paraphrase the information or ideas from a source but fail to cite the author (this can include a classmate's paper).

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
