2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the students will:

1. Master the basic elements of grammar.
2. Increase vocabulary to 100 Kanji and 750 words.
3. Be able to engage in simple conversation.
4. Read and write short sentences.

The completion of this course will be comparable to Level 4 of the Japanese Proficiency Test.

3. Required Materials

- (a) Texts: An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese, Genki I, The Japan Times, Second Edition
- (b) Other An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese, Genki I, Workbook I, The Japan Times, Second Edition

4. Course Content and Schedule

JAPN 101 is designed for students who have completed JAPN 100, or for those with equivalent knowledge. This course will build on what the students have learned and further their skills in writing, reading, speaking and listening. Grammar and vocabulary will be continuously introduced in the context of text dialogues. JAPN 101 will cover Genki I (Lesson 5 to 8).

Chapter Quizzes (Written and Listening)

Written and listening quizzes are given for each chapter. These are worth 6% and 4% respectively.

Assignments

There are four assignments. Each assignment is worth 1.5%. Due date is indicated on the course schedule on page 4 of this outline. Assignments must be completed by the student and individually (work that is copied, done by on-line translation program, etc will receive 0%). **A late submission will lose 1% per day.**

Recitation of Dialogues

Each student is expected to memorize the model dialogues and recite it in front of the instructor. There are 3 recitations, worth 2% each.

Speech Presentation

Each student is asked to make a 3-minute speech presentation. The details will be discussed in class.

Oral Interview

This is a one-on-one interview with the instructor. The students will be asked about 10 questions, and carry on a short conversation with the instructor on a topic given. The details will be discussed in class.

Big Quiz 1/ Big Quiz 2

There are two Big Quizzes: Big Quiz 1 (L5-6) and Big Quiz 2 (L7-8). Each is worth 15% each.

Attendance

Missing a class (lecture or lab) results in 1% deduction from the attendance/participation score each time.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
