2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the students will:

1. Master grammar to an intermediate level.
2. Increase vocabulary to 300 Kanji and 1500 words.
3. Be able to take part in everyday conversation.
4. Read and write at an intermediate level complex/compound sentences.

4. Course Content and Schedule

JAPN 201 is designed for students who have completed JAPN 200, or for those with equivalent knowledge. This course will build on what the students have learned and further their skills in writing, reading, speaking and listening. Grammar and vocabulary will be continuously introduced in the context of text dialogues. JAPN 201 will cover Genki II (Lesson 13 to 16).

Chapter Written & Listening Quizzes

A quiz will be given after completing each chapter. Four quizzes are planned. Each quiz consists of two parts, written and the listening comprehension. It is worth 6% and 4% respectively.

Assignments (see page 4)

There are four assignments in total, worth 3% each. Hardcopy of assignments will be given in class, and the due dates are indicated on the course schedule found on page 4, unless otherwise informed. Assignments must be completed by the student and individually (work that is copied, done by on-line translation program, etc will receive 0%). **A late submission will lose 1% per day.**

Big Quizzes

There are 2 Big Quizzes: Big Quiz 1 (L13-14), Big Quiz 2 (15-16). Each is worth 13% each.

Individual Presentation

Each student will prepare a speech on a topic related to Japan. The procedure will be discussed in class. (6%)

In Class Composition

Each student will write a composition in class. The details will be discussed in class. (6%)

Oral Interview

This is a one on one interview with the instructor. The students will be asked about 10 questions, and carry on a short conversation with the instructor on a topic given. The details will be discussed in class.

Attendance

Missing a class (lecture or lab) results in 1% deduction each time from the attendance/participation score.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- a) Quizzes and Exams must be taken at the scheduled time. There will be no "make-up". Exceptions are granted for only serious illness or other extenuating circumstances (e.g. Accidents, Family affliction etc). **In the case of an emergency, please inform your instructor immediately.** For arranging the make-up quizzes and exams due to illness, **the doctor's note is required**.

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
