2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Spontaneously compose a 4-part chorale in the style of the mid-18th century, and complete a written score capturing all musical details of the composition.
- 2. Improvise an SATB harmonization effecting modulation to any key and a return to tonic, and complete a written score capturing all musical details of the composition.
- 3. Work effectively in composition and analysis with harmonic mixture and chromatic harmonies including "Neapolitan" chords, augmented 6th chords, common-tone chords, altered triads, and extended chords.
- 4. Identify instances of parallel harmonies and atonality in post-1900 works.
- 5. Create a 12-tone matrix.
- Analyze and extrapolate compositional methodologies from advanced sonata forms, multimovement forms employing directional tonality, and small forms demonstrating episodes of posttonal structures.

3. Required Materials

(a) **Textbook:** The Musician's Guide to Theory and Analysis, Third Edition, by Clendinning and Marvin. Available at the Camosun College bookstore. Textbook will be used during EVERY class.

(b) **Supplies:** To EVERY class, bring staff paper, loose-leaf paper, sharp pencil, and eraser.

(c) **Other:** Computer access to the course website on D2L. Weekly homework will be posted. See Section 7, Recommended Materials, below for supplementary course resources.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Dates: 14 Weeks, January 7 - April 13. Plus, April 15-18 + 23-26 for final exams.

Class Location: Victoria Conservatory of Music, Room 339.

Class Meeting Times: Tuesdays, 10:30 AM - 12:20 PM, and Thursdays, 11:00-11:50 AM.

Holidays: Week 7, Tuesday and Thursday, February 19 and 21: Reading Break - No Class.

- (a) Classroom time, 3 hours per week; Estimated out-of-class time, 3 hours per week minimum, provided student attends ALL classes. The amount of time spent on this course will vary widely from student to student.
- (b) The weekly schedule is outlined below on Page 6. For each week of the term, class topics, textbook chapters, and assessment due dates are provided. The following is an overview of the class organization (subject to change): Tuesdays will focus on beginning new weekly material and concepts that will appear on the homework due the next Tuesday (new assignments will be distributed and the previous week's homework will be returned on Tuesdays); Thursdays will be spent finishing weekly material started on the previous Tuesday. Students must be prepared for each class by reading, PRIOR to class, the chapter(s) listed on the weekly schedule (see Page 6).
- (c) Starting in Week 3, weekly homework assignments will be due in class on Tuesdays. These assignments may involve accessing the course website on D2L. The <u>readability</u> of each assignment you hand in will count into its grade. This includes your handwriting and the correctness of your notation (see Section 7a below). Students must only submit their own original work; submitting classmates' assignments on their behalf is not allowed. Periodic pop quizzes (unannounced) will occur at the beginning of class (don't be late!). Attendance and participation in all class periods is mandatory, as this is a course that depends on synthesizing new concepts with in-class practice.
- (d) The midterm exam will be given in Week 8 and will test your knowledge of all the material covered since the beginning of the term. The final composition project will be a larger compositional assignment given at least two weeks early and due in Week 14 with an in-class performance. The final exam will be comprehensive and may occur any time within the final exam period (April 15-18 + 23-26). All students must be present for the final exam; DO NOT make travel plans that overlap with any part of the exam period. Examination schedules are posted on the post-secondary bulletin board at the VCM by late February.

- (e) Late homework that has not been granted a deadline extension WILL be accepted with a penalty of 2 percentage points <u>each day</u> an assignment is late, up to a maximum of 30 percentage points deducted. There are no make-ups for missed quizzes or exams and no extensions of homework deadlines <u>unless your absence is excused AND notice was given PRIOR to class</u>. Absences may be excused for illness, emergency, or participation in institution-sponsored events when appropriate documentation is promptly forwarded to the instructor. In the case of illness, documentation is required from a doctor (or certified healthcare professional) that includes a clear statement of WHAT you could not do and WHEN you could not do it (e.g., "Student was bedridden from March 5-7," or "Student will not be able to use right hand for two weeks, March 1-15"). It is not necessary to disclose the reason for your illness. Upon approval of your doctor's note, accommodations within reason will be made to reschedule missed assessments or grant extensions on due dates.
- (f) Do not bring noise-making devices to class. If you must, turn them OFF (preferred) or be sure your silent mode is truly silent. Extraneous beeps, rings, and buzzes are disrespectful to your classmates and to me a zero-tolerance policy will be observed. Noisy food is also prohibited in the classroom.

Temporary Grade	Description
