- 1. The nature of politics, government, and the state, with special reference to Canada.
- 2. The basics of the executive branch of government the formal, political, and non-political elements, with special reference to the Prime Minister and the cabinet.
- 3. The basics of Parliament its elements, functions, procedures, and problems.
- 4. The basics of the public service its elements, functions, processes, and problems.
- 5. The basics of the justice system types of law, the courts, the administration of justice, and the Charter,
- 6. The basics of political parties their roots, ideologies, financing, leadership selection, and campaigning.
- 7. The basics of the electoral system, and possible alternatives, as well as the role of the press.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Marks will be determined based on the following work:

1. Reading Quizzes – 10%

With each new chapter or reading students will be asked to take an online multiple-choice quiz that accompanies the textbook. The quizzes will cover the reading for that week (a chapter) and must be completed **prior** to the start of that week's class. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start of that week's first class – Mondays at 1:00 PM. There will be 9 reading quizzes throughout the semester.

3. **Short Essays**: 40% (10% per assignment)

Students (individually or as part of a group) will write four short essays a minimum of approximately 250 words each. A choice of four questions will be posted at the start of each section. Students / groups will choose from one of the four questions. Students or groups may submit up to five SEs with the four highest grades counting towards their final grade. Papers should be just as well-crafted as a standard essay. Late assignments will be penalized 10% per day. For more information, see the Assignment section of the D2L content page.

4. **Debate** – 30% (15% Debate Short Essay & 15% Debate Group Performance) The mandatory debate essay, submitted individually, of approximately 250 words is due **March 7** at 11:59 PM. For the group part of the project, students will register (through the D2L) into one of three groups (Pro / Con and Judges). Along with two mandatory prep days, the mandatory in class debate will occur on **April 3**. For more details, see the Assignment section of the D2L content page.

5. Engagement Grade - 5%

All students will be asked to make a meaningful contribution to class activities and demonstrate engagement with topic. There are numerous ways for students to express their engagement. See the D2L site for a full account of participation grading.

6. Take Home Final – 15%

Students (individuals only) will have three days) to compose one essay of approximately 500 words in length (**due at noon on April 18**. Students will answer one short essay questions which draw from themes covered since the beginning of the semester. The essay will be submitted through the course's Drop box.
