2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Produce finished artwork in a variety of media, both black-and-white and full-colour.
- 2. Render illustrations, word balloons, and captions in repro-ready form
- 3. Scan, render and format artwork for both analog (print) and digital (web applications).
- 4. Complete and publish in print and/or web, a 16-page comic or graphic novel

4. Course Content and Schedule

VIST 131 Technique 2

NB: This course and VIST 123 (PERSPECTIVE DRAWING) are closely interconnected, and assignments in VIST 131 will be reviewed in VIST 123, which are to be completed as both CLASSWORK and HOMEWORK

All classes commence with Show & Tell: students share comics and graphic novels they currently read or have recently discovered with the class, along with a brief analysis of the specific appeal of form and/or content, in particular how it relates to the subject at hand

A critical component of classes is the tripartite critique; a critical analysis of assignments by the student, their peers, and the teacher

Week 1 - January 8

LECTURE / DEMONSTRATION: Introduction to VIST 131 Course with overview of learning outcomes and assignments. Introduction to Adobe Creative Cloud, and to basic Photoshop tools and techniques under Window menu: Workspace, Actions, Brushes, Channels, Character/Paragraph, History, Info, Navigator, Paths, Colour/Swatches, and Tools

CLASSWORK: Explore Window menu options and tools

Week 2 - January 15

LECTURE / DEMONSTRATION: Introduction to Photoshop tools and techniques under Edit (Undo, Fade, Cut/Copy/Paste, Fill/stroke, Transform, Keyboard Shortcuts), Layers (Creation, Duplication, Blending Modes, Adjustment, Masks, Matting), and Selection (Layers, Colour Range, Feather, Modify, Transform Load/Save Alpha Channels) menus. Format pages for reproduction

CLASSWORK: Practice formatting pages and apply tools and techniques

Week 3 – January 22

LECTURE / DEMONSTRATION: Advanced use of primary tools (Selection, Move, Lasso, Magic Wand, Crop, Paintbrush, Eraser, Gradient, Paint Bucket) including creation of custom brushes and masks

CLASSWORK: Practice colouring pages from Fall Term assignments

Week 4 - January 29

LECTURE / DEMONSTRATION: Advanced use of secondary tools (Clone stamp, Art History Brush, Blur, Sharpen, Smudge, Dodge, Burn, Sponge)

CLASSWORK: Colouring of first 8-pager

Assignment #1: 8-page comic, is DUE at the beginning of the next class! This assignment is worth 30% of your final grade.

Week 5 - February 5

LECTURE / DEMONSTRATION: Introduction to Photoshop tools and techniques under Image (Colour Modes, Adjustments, Levels, Curves, Colour Balance, Brightness & Contrast, Hue & Saturation) and Filter (Artistic, Blur, Brush Strokes, Distort Noise, Pixelate, Render, Sharpen, Sketch, Stylize, Texture) menus

CLASSWORK: Finish colouring of first 8-pager
