- Describe the four fields of anthropology in relation to what they offer to our understanding of contemporary human issues.
- 2. Outline the anthropological perspective, including holism, cultural relativism, comparativism and evolution.
- 3. Discuss the trends in human evolution in order to understand the modern human species.
- 4. Explain the importance of archaeological investigation to modern society.
- 5. Describe the basic structure of language as it relates to society and culture.
- 6. Define culture, including its characteristics and structures, in order to understand its centrality to anthropology.
- 7. Examine and analyze specific examples such as family structure, religion, social organization, and culture change in relation to anthropologic discourse
- 8. Address ethnocentrism as a barrier to understanding other cultures.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a)	Assignments (40%)	In Class Labs/Tutorials (8 x 5% = 40%) Students will complete six, mostly in-class assignments over the semester. There are five labs and three tutorials, each worth five percent. The labs will take place during class time. The tutorials will include written work, based on assigned readings. Students are required to complete the readings before coming to class; student may be required to complete a portion of the written assignment prior to the tutorial class. Please read the tutorial handouts for more detail.
		Students must attend the lab/tutorial class in order to receive credit for these assignments. Students will not be permitted to submit the labs or written assignments for partial marks. Please see the course schedule below for lab/tutorial dates.
(b)	Exams (60%)	Exam 1: 20% - October 10 Exam 2: 20% - November 14 Exam 3: 20% - Examination Period The exams may consist of multiple choice, definitions, and short/long answer questions.

INSTRUCTIONAL POLICIES

7.1 Attendance

Late assignments will not be accepted in this course. Assignments must be completed on the day they are assigned.

7.3 Mark/Grade Challenges and Appeals

The reason for this is two-fold. One, it is distracting to the students sitting behind you. Two, studies have shown that when students multi-task in class (text, watch movies, check email) they do worse on exams and assignments. If a student is found to be engaging in these activities during class and disrupting other students, they will be prohibited from using their laptop in class.

7.6 Lateness, and classroom conduct

Please try to be on time for class. If you are late, please enter the classroom quietly and do your best not to disrupt the other students. Please refrain from speaking with your classmates during the lecture. It is disruptive to the people sitting around you, as well as the instructor. Please DO ask questions during the lecture; I am quite happy to be interrupted to rephrase or clarify any points I have made.

7.7 Missed Exams

Failure to attend a midterm will result in a mark of zero, unless I have been informed within 2 working days and an excused absence has been granted. In the case of illness, a medical note is required in order to write a make-up exam. If you fail to come for a make-up at the scheduled time, the exam will not be further rescheduled unless an additional medical certificate is presented to me. Unavailability of texts and pressure of other work does not constitute a reason for missing exams. Rescheduling a quiz or assignment following an excused absence will be done at the mutual convenience of the student and instructor.

PLAGIARISM

- 2. Submitting an assignment in which you have copied or cut and pasted one or more passages from one or more other works or an internet site without enclosing those passages in quotation marks and providing clear, correct citations for those passages.
- 3. Submitting an assignment in which you take one or more ideas from another work(s) without citing them, even when you reword or put those ideas in your own words (that is, paraphrasing them). You must provide clear, correct citations for theories, arguments, facts, stories, or other information that you did not come up with on your own.
- 4. Submitting an assignment that an editor or tutor, whether amateur or professional, has partially or entirely rewritten for you. A tutor is not a copy editor. A tutor's role is to explain general principles of writing, grammar, syntax, punctuation, and spelling.
- 5. Submitting a group project which contains plagiarism. It is the responsibility of all members of the group to monitor the progress of the work to ensure that plagiarism does not occur.

Temporary Grade	Description	
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.	
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.	
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
