2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Give digital form to objects and concepts through traditional and digital design based systems;
2. Describe fundamental, historical, and contemporary design styles and movements;
3. Use industry standard computer software and user interfaces for digital design and drawing;
4. Apply traditional methods of design within contemporary digital methodologies and applications;
5. Demonstrate engagement with image and text combinations and layout strategies;
6. Organize, strategize, and implement projects collaboratively and independently;
7. Plan, design, and create content structures with critical awareness and understanding of image use and meaning in the digital age;
8. Interpret and generate constructive inter-culturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.

3. Required Materials

A sketchbook (physical or digital. 100 pages), a pack of micropens (I recommend the 6 pack of Sakura pens), a thumb drive, and a hard drive.

4. Requirements and Responsibilities

Show up to class. Be on time. Be prepared to work. Turn off your phone during class time. Do the assignments. Contribute to discussions. Support, help, and respect one another.

5. Class Attendance

Class attendance is mandatory and punctuality is required. All absences and late attendances must be explained. Failure to comply with this principle will affect your evaluation and may result in failure.

*Note that active class participation/contribution is 10% of your grade. This includes active listening, participation in class discussions, doing your in-class assignments and readings.

6. Course Content and Schedule

Students will be introduced to fundamental design and drawing principles for artists and designers looking to work within digital environments. Students will become familiar with digital drawing and design principles through projects that advance and emphasize clarity, graphic precision, and visual communication skills. The course will also introduce traditional and digital drawing tools and techniques that can be developed and applied to fundamental illustration and design within temporal and spatial applications.

In this course students will work on the development of their own visual language. As a foundation-level class, risk, versatility and experimentation are encouraged. Instead of thinking about work in terms of 'is it good?' or 'is it bad?' students are encouraged to ask 'what is it?' and 'what does it do?'.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.

IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
