2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Demonstrate speaking and listening comprehension by engaging in basic conversations about daily life.
2. Read simple paragraphs and answer written comprehension questions related to the content.
3. Express thoughts and ideas in the present tense, orally and in writing, using foundational grammatical structures and vocabulary.
4. Recognize and discuss the cultural context for the French language.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Students will practice the four proficiencies in French: writing, reading, speaking, and listening. Active participation during class time and active learning outside class will enhance the individual learning experience. Because many learning activities will be conducted in pairs or small groups, this active participation will also help other members of the class with their French language development. Students will be expected to prepare for and practice these activities.

Activities and assignments (10%+25%)

Many scheduled activities will be performed in class, both in pairs and in small groups. While some of these activities will be practice work, other activities, including out of class assignments, will be subject to evaluation. Evaluation of student participation (i.e. preparedness and attendance) will also take place. Thus, it is very important to attend class regularly.

The activities have been already scheduled (see the calendar above or on the home page of D2L) and they will be announced on the D2L weekly plan the week before the due date. Students will receive feedback on these activities. Students who do not prepare these activities out of class and / or not attend the class during these activities will not receive marks. In addition, students will be asked to complete out of class assignments. These assignments **must be completed** by the due date at the beginning of each class. **Late assignments, including after class, will lose 5% per day unless accompanied by medical documentation of illness or other legitimate reason (see below).** Assignments more than five days late (including weekends) will no longer be accepted. On weekends, students can send a copy (e.g.: a picture) by email but only paper submissions will be graded. Please note that these assignments are based on self-learning and self-evaluation (e.g. correction): students will have access to the answer keys, except for the reading and writing, and will have to answer to a questionnaire in order to help them to evaluate their strength and weakness, and prepare them for tests. Teacher will give marks on the self-evaluation (e.g.: correction, answers to questionnaire), the reading, and the writing.

Oral tests (dialogues and monologues) (10%+15%)

Students will prepare and present dialogues (orals #1-2) and monologue (oral #2) on the topics presented in class. The presentation **must be entirely created by the student(s)** without the help of software or other persons. The objective of this activity is to encourage student learning while expressing creativity through conversation. Students are invited to show their progress by submitting their dialogues (transcripts in paper version only) to the instructor before the oral tests in order to receive feedback on grammar, syntax, vocabulary before the submission on Dropbox. Students are also welcome to meet the teacher in order to practice their oral expression (pronunciation, rhythm, and intonation). The orals will have to be uploaded on D2L Dropbox.

Tests (10%+15%+15%)

Students will have to complete three tests that include listening, reading, writing, and grammar. The final test will be completed during the examination period.

Illness, accident and family affliction **are the only legitimate reasons** to miss an evaluated activity in class or an exam (tests and dialogues). The teacher reserves the right to require a doctor's note if a student is absent due to illness. Students who are absent the day a test is given are expected to contact the teacher **prior to the exam.**

Remember: It is your responsibility to find out from colleagues what class work, announcements or assignments you have missed while absent, as well as to check the D2L for this course periodically.

Note: Cheating and plagiarism

The assessments, orals, and tests must be completed without any translators or proofreading (speaking) by anyone else. Work that suggests the use of external help will not be accepted. Using translator programs or having another person do your assignments, your tests, or create your oral dialogues constitutes **cheating**.

Also, copying an entire assignments (including dialogues) or representing specific passages as if they are students own words is **plagiarism**. B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
