2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will:

- 1. Be able to read and write two sets of Japanese phonetic alphabets, Hiragana and Katakana.
- 2. Learn about 40 Kanji and 350 words.
- 3. Be able to introduce himself/herself, describe locations of things, etc., in basic Japanese.

3. Required Materials

- (a) Texts: An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese, Genki I, The Japan Times, Second Edition
- (b) Other An Integrated Course in Elementary Japanese, Genki I, Workbook I, The Japan Times, Second Edition

4. Course Content and Schedule

JAPN 100 is designed for students who have no previous knowledge of the Japanese language and aims at balanced development of the four language skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing. Upon acquiring the fundamental sentence structures, expressions and vocabulary items, students can comprehend and carry on a basic conversation in Japanese within limited contexts. JAPN 100 covers Genki I, Lesson 1-4.

Assignments (see page 4)

There are four assignments which worth 2% each. The assignments are given from the Genki Workbook. Assignments must be completed individually by the student (work that is copied, done by on-line translation program, etc will receive 0%). A late submission will lose 1% per day.

Chapter Quizzes (Written & Listening)

Written and listening quizzes are given after completing each lesson. They worth 8% and 5% respectively.

Big Quiz (Written only)

Big Quiz (covers L1-4; but the focus is on L3 and 4). It is given at the end of the semester. 1x15%.

Recitation

Each student is expected to memorize the model dialogues and recite it in front of the instructor. 4x3% each.

Oral Interview

During the last week of the class, each student will have an one-on-one interview with the instructor. During the interview, the students must answer about 10 questions in Japanese. The format is Q/A and the details will be discussed in class.

Attendance

If a student misses a class (lecture or lab), he/she will lose 1% from the attendance/participation score.

IMPORTANT NOTES

- a) Quizzes and Exams must be taken at the scheduled time. There will be no "make-up". Exceptions are granted for only serious illness or other extenuating circumstances (e.g. accidents, Family affliction etc).
 In the case of emergency, please <u>inform your instructor immediately</u>. For arranging a make-up quiz due to illness, <u>the doctor's note is required</u>.
- b) It is <u>students' responsibility to check the tentative schedule</u> (p.4) and be prepared for each class. If there are any changes, the instructor will announce in class and/or on D2L. Please check for any announcement on D2L regularly.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
