#### (b) Group Presentation (15% of course grade)

In small teams you will create a Powerpoint presentation on a current issue in Psychology. The instructor will select the members of the group and you will be provided a list of topics to choose from. More details will be provided in class.

#### (c) Exams (69% of course grade)

There are three exams in this course. All tested material will be from the textbook and class lectures. The exams will consist of multiple choice and short answer questions. Exam #1: 23%

# **B.** Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
Ι	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
