2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Define and diagram procedures used in behaviour analysis.
- 2. Explain the advantages and/or disadvantages of choosing a specific behavioural modification procedure when given a case example of behaviour.
- 3. Describe ethical considerations when choosing to use any behaviour modification procedure.
- 4. Explain single-subject research design and how the various methodologies meet or fail to meet the rules of scientific inquiry.
- 5. Analyze and describe the behavioural procedures used in a variety of research and applied examples.
- 6. Write an APA style research paper reviewing current research in behaviour analysis.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a) Assignments: There will be 6 of these in total asking you to apply behavioural concepts to a case study (observations in field, case files, your own behavior, etc.). They take approximately 1 hour each to complete. The top five scores count for 10% each toward your final grade for a total of 50% from assignments. Due Dates:

Assignments are due in drop-box the Thursday following the week they are assigned. They should be submitted by 11:59 PM. In other words, you have a week to complete the assignments.

(b) Quizzes: There will be 10 short, multiple choice quizzes that are open book, and intended to make sure that you understood the content. Each of these will be worth 3% for a total of 30% from quizzes.

Due Dates for Quizzes: all quizzes should be completed by the following Thursday by 11:59 PM.

(c) Acceptance and Commitment Therapy Application: Acceptance and Commitment therapy is an exciting tool in behavior analysis. You'll learn its basic tenets and how to apply them to your own Template Published by Educational Approvals Office (VP Ed Office) Page 2 of 4 goals, and thought and feelings that might be getting in the way of those goals. You'll work through an example from your own life and that write-up will be worth 15% of your final grade.

(d) **Special Interest Topics Discussion Posts:** Toward the end of the course, I will be posting little special interest modules on behaviours such as lying, procrastination, addictions, depression/anxiety/bipolar, etc. You'll be asked just to read through 2 of those modules that are of interest, and write a little discussion post about your reaction, resources you might have come across, questions and comments. Each of these will be worth 2.5% for a total of 5%.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete</i> : A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress</i> : A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal</i> : A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
