5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

(a) **Assignments:** There are three assignments in total, asking you to relate child developmental theory to your own childhood, looking at cultural variations in the birth experience and looking at the role of traditions and rituals, family roles, gender roles, etc. in your family experience. Each assignment is worth 12% for a total of 36% from assignments.

Assignment 3: In drop-box by November 30th, 11:59 PM

(b) Quizzes: There are seven quizzes in total, and your six best scores will count for 5% each for a total of 30% from quizzes. These will be open book and their purpose is to check to make sure you're understanding the information.

(c) Final Paper: This paper asks the student to observe a child in infancy/toddlerhood, preschool or middle childhood and to conduct some activities aimed at informally assessing cognitive development, physical development or social/emotional development. The student will tie this in to a multi-systemic theory. A detailed summary of the paper will appear under "Research Paper" in the content section. The paper will be worth 24% of the grade.

(d) Virtual Child: You'll be raising your own "virtual child" during the course. The program will ask you parenting questions at each stage, and depending on your answers, will affect your child's physical, cognitive and social/emotional development. Along the way there are teacher's reports, doctor's reports, etc. and you will be asked to submit three of these, along with a paragraph reflection in the "Discussions" section. Details will be under the "Virtual Child" Module under "Contents". Virtual Child will be worth 10% of your final grade

Temporary Grade	Description
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I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
