2. Intended Learning Outcomes

- 1. Outline the legislative basis, structure and functions of the various components of the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 2. Identify how each component of the criminal justice system interrelates with other components and with the larger society within which it operates.
- 3. Track the process of an accused person through the critical decision-making points of the Canadian criminal justice system.
- 4. Identify and critically discuss contemporary issues affecting the structure and operations of the Canadian criminal justice (e.g. youth justice, female offenders and Aboriginal justice).

5. Basis of Student Assessment

Mid Term Exam – 25% February 24

The mid-term exam format will be true/false, fill in the blank, multiple choice and short answer.

The final exam format will be true/false, fill in the blank, multiple choice and short answer.

• Court Report – 15% Due March 9

You are required to attend and observe a criminal case in Provincial or Supreme Court at the Victoria or Western Communities Courts. Your written or oral report will summarize the proceedings observed.

• Criminal Justice Report - 15% Due April 6

You are required to write a report on a topic, of your choice, that relates to the Canadian criminal justice system. The purpose is to identify a specific event, trend or area of media interest and explore the topic in more depth.

Current Event Discussions – 15% Random Dates

During randomly selected classes current criminal justice events will be discussed. Attendance and participation are required to attain the marks for these discussions.

Criminal Justice Process Scenario – 5% Random Dates

During selected classes a scenario will be used to follow an accused person through the critical decision-making points of the Canadian criminal justice system. Attendance and participation are required to attain the marks for these discussions.

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
1	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that, due to design may require a further enrollment in the same course. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course. (For these courses a final grade will be assigned to either the 3 rd course attempt or at the point of course completion.)
cw	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.

Late Penalty
