2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Notate from dictation, sight-sing, and improvise a melody which forms a part of an SATB chorale in mid-18th-century style.
- 2. Using lead-sheet and root-quality chord notation or Roman numeral and figured bass notation, notate from dictation the chords which support a melody of up to 16-bars in length.
- 3. Recognize by ear, reproduce with the voice, notate from dictation, and sight-sing from written notation the discrete pitches of all triadic constructions to the 13th within a diatonic key.
- 4. Using vocalization, demonstrate anticipated bass movement between sounding chords of a diatonic key, resolution of non-chord tones and dissonant pitches within an extended chord, and pitches indicated above a bass note by simple figured bass and root-quality chord notation.
- 5. Recognize by ear modulation to or tonicization of closely-related diatonic keys in a harmonized musical fragment.

6. Identify by ear the musical texture, and the beginning and ending points of major sections within a work in simple dance, song, and variation forms.

3. Required Materials

- **(a) Textbook:** *Music for Sight Singing*, Tenth Edition, by Rogers and Ottman. Available at the Camosun College bookstore. Textbook will be used during EVERY class.
- **(b) Supplies:** To EVERY class, bring staff paper, loose-leaf paper, sharp pencil, and eraser.
- **(c) Other:** Computer access to the course website on D2L. Weekly homework will be posted. See Section 7, Recommended Materials, below for supplementary course resources.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Dates: 14 Weeks, January 6 - April 9. Plus, April 14-22 for final exams.

Class Location: Victoria Conservatory of Music, Room 303.

Class Meeting Times: Wednesdays and Fridays, 1:00-1:50 PM.

Holidays: Week 7, Wednesday and Friday, February 19 and 21: Reading Break - No Class. Week 14, Friday, April 10: Good Friday - No Class.

Exam Week, Monday, April 13: Easter Monday - No Class.

- (a) Classroom time, 2 hours per week; Estimated out-of-class time, 2 hours per week minimum provided student attends ALL classes. The amount of time spent practicing for this course will vary widely from student to student.
- (b) The weekly schedule is outlined below on Page 6. For each week of the term, class topics, textbook chapters, and assessment due dates are provided. In general, Wednesdays will focus on sight singing/reading skills and Fridays will focus on dictation/writing skills (some cross-over is likely). Class time will be spent practicing skills together and individually.
- (c) Starting in Week 2, **weekly homework** assignments are due in class on Fridays. These assignments usually involve accessing the course website on D2L and writing/notating answers on your own paper. The <u>readability</u> of each assignment you hand in will count toward its grade. This includes your handwriting and the correctness of your notation (see Section 7a below). Students must only submit their own original work; submitting classmates' assignments on their behalf is not allowed. Periodic **quizzes** (unannounced) will occur at the beginning of class (don't be late!). Attendance and participation is mandatory, as this is a course that depends on in-class practice.
- (d) There will be a two-part comprehensive **final exam** at the end of the term. Each of the two separate parts of the final exam may occur <u>any time</u> within the final exam period (April 14-22). All students must be present for both parts of the exam; DO NOT make travel plans that overlap

with any part of the exam period. Examination schedules are posted on the post-secondary bulletin board at the VCM by late February.

4. Course Content and Schedule (Continued)

- (e) Late homework that has not been granted a deadline extension WILL be accepted with a penalty of 2 percentage points <u>each day</u> an assignment is late, up to a maximum of 30 percentage points deducted. Toward the end of the term, the instructor will set a date after which no late homework will be accepted. There are no make-ups for missed quizzes or exams and no extensions of homework deadlines **unless your absence is excused AND notice was given PRIOR to class**. Absences may be excused for illness, emergency, or participation in institution-sponsored events when appropriate documentation is promptly forwarded to the instructor. In the case of prolonged illness, documentation is required from a doctor (or certified healthcare professional) that includes a clear statement of WHAT you could not do and WHEN you could not do it (e.g., "Student was bedridden from March 5-7," or "Student will not be able to use right hand for two weeks, March 1-15"). It is not necessary to disclose the reason for your illness. Upon approval of your doctor's note, accommodations within reason will be made to reschedule missed assessments or grant extensions on due dates.
- (f) Do not bring noise-making devices to class. If you must, turn them OFF (preferred) or be sure your silent mode is truly silent. Extraneous beeps, rings, and buzzes are disrespectful to your classmates and to me a zero-tolerance policy will be observed. Noisy food is also prohibited in the classroom.

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: Aural Skills and Tonal Harmony are a co-requisite unit. A passing grade of C or better must be earned in BOTH Aural Skills 2 (MUSC 115) AND Tonal Harmony 2 (MUSC 113) in order to continue next Fall Term with Aural Skills (MUSC 214 or 218) and Harmony/Theory (MUSC 212 or 216). A grade of D or F in EITHER Aural Skills OR Tonal Harmony will prevent registration in the continuation of BOTH courses, and will need to be improved to a grade of C or better by retaking the course(s) in the subsequent academic year.

- (a) *The Norton Manual of Music Notation*, by George Heussenstamm. An optional resource for learning placement of traditional notational elements and how to handwrite music.

- (c) The **teoría** website. http://www.teoria.com/ Access this website for supplementary exercises, tutorials, reference, and articles for both ear training and music theory skills.
- (d) MacGAMUT software for ear-training drills and practice. https://www.macgamut.com/ An optional tool for extra help practicing musicianship skills. The software can be purchased online for US\$40 (download the free demo version first to test it out). Possibly better than practicing with a human, which is another (highly recommended) option.
