2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

- 1. Recognize by ear and notate from a harmonic progression the modes of the major scale and chromatic chord substitutions;
- 2. Recognize by ear and notate from dictation, modulations to distant key centers using standard jazz chord notation and/or Roman numerals;
- 3. Clap rhythms in complex meters while counting the beat;
- 4. Improvise vocally over contemporary songs from the American Songbook and the jazz canon:
- 5. Aurally detect errors in printed scores and individual parts;
- 6. Sing two improvised solos from the jazz cannon from memory while simultaneously clapping a polyrhythmic pattern.

3. Required Materials

- (a) Texts The Real Book, vol. 1, 6th edition
- (b) Other access to the internet, manuscript paper and pencil

4. Course Content and Schedule

Modal Harmony

This course relies on in-class practice and individual practice of the following skills – recognition and reproduction of intervals up to a major 13th, recognition of chords up to the 13th degree, utilization of scales relating to modal music, perform polyrhythms and rhythmic dictation of 4 bars of duple, triple and compound meters. 2 transcriptions are required as well as a final exam and in-class quizzes. Songs covered in the course: Spain by Chick Corea, So What by Miles Davis, Blue In Green by Bill Evans, Killer Joe by Benny Golson, Inner Urge by Joe Henderson, Afro Blue by Mongo Santamaria, Lydiot by George Russell, Twelve Tone Tune Two by Bill Evans

5. Basis of Student Assessment

- (a) Assignments 2 transcriptions are required, each worth 20% of the course mark (total of 40%)
- (b) Quizzes there will be periodic quizzes on the material covered, worth 10% of the course mark
- (c) Exams the exam is in 2 parts each worth 20% of the entire course mark, there is a written and an aural exam (total of 40%)
- (d) Other regular attendance is mandatory and is worth 10% of the course mark.

Temporary Grade	Description
