Upon completion of this course a student will be able to:

1. The nature of politics, government, and the state, with special reference to Canada.
2. The basics of the executive branch of government – the formal, political, and non-political elements, with special reference to the Prime Minister and the cabinet.
3. The basics of Parliament – its elements, functions, procedures, and problems.
4. The basics of the public service – its elements, functions, processes, and problems.
5. The basics of the justice system – types of law, the courts, the administration of justice, and the Charter.
6. The basics of political parties – their roots, ideologies, financing, leadership selection, and campaigning.
7. The basics of the electoral system, and possible alternatives, as well as the role of the press.

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Marks will be determined based on the following work:

1. **Reading Quizzes:** 10% (1.1% per quiz)

With each new chapter students will be asked to take an online multiple choice quiz that accompanies the textbook. The quizzes will cover the reading for a chapter and must be completed **prior** to the start of that week's class. The online submission window will close one hour prior to the start of that chapter. For all but reading quizzes three and four (which close on Wednesdays) reading quizzes close on Mondays at 3:00 PM.

2. **Short Essays:** 60% (15% per assignment)

Students will write a four in class short essays of approximately 250 words each throughout the semester. For each short essay, and the section it covers, students will have access to a list of four questions. From those four questions two will appear for in the class essay. The four questions will be posted at the start of each section. On the day of the in class short essay, students will be provided with two of the four questions. They will answer one of the two.

Attendance is required at each in class short essay day. Attendance will be taken.

Students will write their in class short essay without any outside assistance, notes, textbook, the use of the internet, or the like. For more information, see the Assignment section of the D2L content page.

3. **Engagement Grade** - 5%

All students will be asked to make a meaningful contribution to class activities and demonstrate engagement with topic. There are numerous ways for students to express their engagement. See the D2L site for a full account of participation grading.

4. **Take Home Final** – 25%

A final exam will consist of a take home essays due at **11:59 PM** on **Friday April 17**. Students will have **84 hours** to compose an essay of approximately 500 words in length. Students will answer one short essay question which draws from themes covered since the beginning of the semester. The essay will be submitted through the course's D2L Assignment drop box. B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
