2. Intended Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Describe major contemporary issues in psychology and explain their historical antecedents.
- 2. Apply psychological theories and understanding of current psychological issues to personal experience.
- 3. Conduct impartial studies of psychological topics and arrive at logical inferences and conclusions from collected data.

4. Course Content and Schedule

Classes comprise lectures and seminar work. Seminar work includes discussions, activities, and chapter reviews. **DOING THE ASSIGNED READING BEFORE CLASS WILL HELP IN THE UNDERSTANDING OF LECTURES AND DISCUSSIONS. ASSIGNED READING IS PERTINENT TO DOING WELL ON CHAPTER REVIEWS**

*Three exams:

Comprise multiple choices, true and false, short answer and essay. Exams require you to apply the terms and concepts of the course, not just recognize definitions. The scores on all three exams will comprise 54% of course grade. Each exam is worth 18% and material is NOT ACCUMULATIVE. Please refer to handout distributed in class for details. There will be no make-up opportunities for an exam missed without medical documentation.

Chapter Reviews:

Chapter reviews comprise 17 multiple-choice questions and one short essay 3 points. Material covered on chapter reading and in class notes. The purpose is to ensure the student remains current with course material. Each review is worth 4% each and there are eight chapter reviews. The best seven scores credited toward 28% of course. Full seminar attendance is required to write each chapter review. If you know you will be arriving late, be sure to email instructor. Missing one of eight reviews will not negatively effect grade.

One Assignment:

Students choose one of four topics. Each assignment based on material from chapter readings and lecture notes. A title page and reference page written in APA 6th edition are required and two points deducted if missed or not APA accurate. Assignments submitted in HARD COPY ONLY and at the start of class. Assignments guidelines distributed the first class. Be sure to choose carefully with close attention to due dates. 10%

In class attendance/participation: 08%

In class activities are completed in weekly lectures and seminars contribute toward participation grade=20 marks. In class activities are assigned to topic and not announced ahead of time. There are NO make-up opportunities for in class activities missed.

NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS accepted. Extension granted only if requested before due date. Vacations or scheduled flights not considered emergencies.

STUDENT RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- 1. Reading the assigned material is required, prior to class, in order to prepare for tests and to participate in seminar. Attendance is essential since key concepts covered in the lectures many not be in the course readings. In class activities, eight chapter reviews, three exams, and one assignment requires completion for meeting all learning outcomes.
- 2. Students contact the instructor with medical documentation, if wanting to make up chapter reviews and exams. **Only one reschedule date** provided for any make up chapter review or exam.
- If a student decides to miss class ensure to inquire about any announcements and key concepts not understood. There are no in class activity made up outside of lecture or seminar.
- 4. Any work that is copied, plagiarized, or fabricated will automatically receive an "F" grade. All work submitted in APA 6th edition referenced, prepared according to the American Psychological Association format and must be submitted by **HARD COPY ONLY**.
- 5. **Please note all due dates.** Extensions requested in writing prior to assignment due date. Extension approval NOT GRANTED on due date. Any class missed; discuss notes with a fellow student first before contacting instructor. Questions on any assignment or exam contact instructor first before a fellow student.

STUDENT STUDY TECNIQUES: Effective studying (SQ3R)

- 1. **Survey:** Scan chapter titles, subtitles, and chapter summary before reading the chapter
- 2. **Question**: formulate questions from the textbook, lecture notes using headings and subheadings. Use on line glossary and flash cards to define terminology and concepts
- **3. Read:** be sure to read theories and concepts to compare and contrast similarities and differences between the bio-psychosocial perspectives. An example, how does psychoanalytic theory compare to the cognitive social learning theory? Keep your questions in mind and do not skip graphs, boxes, tables etc.
- **4. Rehearse:** prepare to come to lecture asking questions after you test yourself multiple times. If uncomfortable asking questions in class than email questions or book a time to see instructor. Also self-testing is available on the free book companion website (www.worthpublishers.com/myers).
- 5. **Review:** Create a summary covering all your questions and answers. Complete chapter reviews and list all the key terms and operationally define.
