Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Quizzes: These will be true/false and multiple choice and test your general understanding of the material in the modules. They will be five quizzes worth 6% each for a total of 30%.

Assignments: Will ask you to explore developmental theory and concepts in more depth. They will have you looking at multi-cultural perspectives, your own sources of influence for development, and research in varied educational practices, along with other options. There are 4 in total worth 15% each for a total of 60% from assignments.

Special Interest Topics: Because this course covers physical, cognitive and social development from birth until death, there isn't a lot of opportunity to explore topics in a lot of depth. At the end of the modules there will be six additional learning units going into depth about a variety of topics in developmental psychology. Some of these will be generated in response to class interest, and others will be generated due to their importance. You will choose two of these topics, study them and then post a two paragraph discussion point on each, so that you can share opinions, resources and thoughts with peers. You will also be asked to comment on two of your peer's submissions. There will be two of these worth 5% each for a total of 10% from Discussions.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary grades are assigned for specific circumstances and will convert to a final grade according to the grading scheme being used in the course. Temporary Grade	Description
I	<i>Incomplete:</i> A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	<i>In progress:</i> A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	<i>Compulsory Withdrawal:</i> A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
