2. Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

- 1. Define contemporary three-dimensional art.
- 2. Apply concepts, materials, and processes that have evolved since the mid-20th century.
- 3. Apply three-dimensional visual language.
- 4. Demonstrate the safe and proper use of hand tools, power tools and equipment in the studio.
- 5. To interpret and generate constructive interculturally aware critiques of one's own and others' projects.

3. Required Materials

Students are expected to have items listed below. Links to items are provided for your convenience only and is not an endorsement for the products. Better tools are more expensive (better ergonomics, run smoother and quieter) but most will last a lifetime with general or household use.

- O Plug in or cordless drill. Examples:
 - Canadian Tire cordless drill
 - o <u>Castle</u> or <u>Home Hardware</u> will have similar products. I recommend supporting local brick and mortar stores.
 - o Home Depot cordless drill & corded drill
 - Trigger clamp. Minimum one 4.5 inch. Examples:
 - o Such as this set from Home Depot
 - o Canadian Tire set.
 - o Robertson driver bits. 2 inches long, Size 2, sometimes in RED colour. (minimum 2)
 - o Castle
 - o Home Depot

- Multi-head screwdriver (this can be combined with the above)
 - o Canadian Tire
 - o Home Depot
 - o Amazon.ca
- Access to a jigsaw, coping saw, handsaw or oscillating saw
 - o Castle jigsaw, oscillating saw
 - o Canadian Tire jigsaw, oscillating saw
- Extra blades (for cutting wood) for your choice of saw
- O Access to reliable internet with internet browser. You will also need a webcam and audio.
- o Full size glue gun
 - o Canadian Tire
 - o Cook St
- Image capturing device such as a camera or smartphone
- Large permanent marker
- O Notebook/sketchbook (inexpensive) & pen & pencil
- O Package of multi-grade sandpaper (or 3 sheets each of 60, 80, 120 grit)
- Pair of all metal scissors
- o Pair of sturdy shoes (no sandals, open toed, or high-heel shoes allowed in studio)
- O Pair pliers or locking pliers with wire cutter (6" or 8")
- o Roll masking tape (app. 2")
- O Set drill bits (HHS Twist 1/16" 1/4" in I/16" or equivalent increments)
- Sturdy utility knife
- Tape measure (min. 10 feet)
- o Metal ruler. Minimum 12".

- Paint brush for acrylic paint (app. 2")
- Staple gun (T50 or J21 or equivalent)
- Tool container
- Weldbond or equivalent white glue 500ml or 1 litre
- Pair of overalls or Apron

MODES OF COURSE DELIVERY

Sync = Synchronous delivery involves online studies through chat and videoconferencing. This kind of learning tool is real-time. It is like a virtual classroom that allows students to ask, and teachers to answer questions instantly, through instant messaging, which is why it is called synchronous.

Async= Asynchronous delivery involves various forms of digital and online learning in which students learn from instruction—such as prerecorded video lessons or game-based learning tasks that students complete on their own—that is not being delivered in person or in real time.

F2F Face to Face = (F2F) course is delivered in the traditional classroom setting. This means that scheduled normative hours take place in the physical classroom.

An example of Synchronous delivery are the Project introductions. The Group Discussions are Asynchronous. An example of F2F sessions at the Young Building 117 & the Fine Arts Annex 102 a.k.a. Sculpture Studio

5. Basis of Student Assessment (Weighting)

Each student will be expected to complete assignments on time, and are expected to attend each class and contribute at group analysis of completed works.

There are three components considered for the final grade:

- 60% an understanding of the issues and concerns of contemporary art as demonstrated by completed projects
- 30% critiques and participation. Marks will be deducted for late projects and assignments and absence during critiques and discussions
- 10% tools and materials and related quizzes

Missing assignment uploads and group discussion will seriously jeopardize your successful completion of the course. Tardiness will also have the same effect.

Involvement and participation will also be evaluated on the level of care and on the quality of your engagement with your work.

There is also a final interview for Visual Arts program students during examination week*. The criteria will be as stated in the student handbook. A grade of "C" or higher is required in order to continue in the Visual Arts program, or to attain the prerequisite for Art 142 onwards.

B. Temporary Grades

Temporary Grade	Description
I	Incomplete: A temporary grade assigned when the requirements of a course have not yet been completed due to hardship or extenuating circumstances, such as illness or death in the family.
IP	In progress: A temporary grade assigned for courses that are designed to have an anticipated enrollment that extends beyond one term. No more than two IP grades will be assigned for the same course.
CW	Compulsory Withdrawal: A temporary grade assigned by a Dean when an instructor, after documenting the prescriptive strategies applied and consulting with peers, deems that a student is unsafe to self or others and must be removed from the lab, practicum, worksite, or field placement.
